Army About Due To Take Yale in Today's Grid Battle

Sport Writer Believes West Point Will Bowl Over Collegiate Opponent

NEW HAVEN.—Faded and colorless, as if in a spirit of indifference in training and environment will meet in the third annual football game of the Army-Yale series this afternoon in the shadow of the great bowl. The customary trials, incidental to the presence of the entire cadet corps in dress uniforms, will be observed in all their colorful detail, the occasion being second only in the respect to the meeting of the Army and Navy when color runs rich, red and rampant. Not less than 75,000 persons will view the game.

The game itself, important, does not constitute the ultimate moment in the lives of the two teams. Both would not object seriously to a victory, yet the general attitude is that they are taking the contest "in their stride"; hence will not mount ardently over a defeat.

The Army, in fact, has yet to win at the Yale Bowl, having been beaten in the first of the series in 1921 and getting a 7 to 7 tie in last season's meeting. Neither team has exactly followed in either case.

This year's Army team is believed to be due, however. It has Gaybach, Mulligan, Wood, Smythe and other stars of the 1922 ensemble, plus Hewitt, former Pitt star, who adds to the offense a punch the Army hitherto lacked. One defeat has been sustained so far this season, that being the 12 to 6 reverse scored by Notre Dame. However, it is an trick at all loss to the Hoosiers by two touchdowns.

Yale is said to have a real Yale team for the first time in many years. In fact, some claim that it is easily the best of the Big Three, but is trying to keep the fact under cover, it being deemed that moderate publicity ruined the blue in 1921 and 1922.

Tad Jones has a wealth of back-field stars, as always in spite of the lamentable loss of O'Brien, and his line is declared to be above the average. Yale combination. Today's game will determine the truth of this with much of this, but not all.

With Harvard, Princeton and Navy teams sitting in the stands neither team is likely to give of its ultimate best at any time.

IDLENESS BANE OF NEW WOMAN, VISITORS' VIEW

Restive Because They Have Not Sufficient Work to Keep Them Busy, Says Mrs. Soderblom.

CHICAGO.—Into the United States where men never have been able to do anything right, comes the wife of the prince for Sweden of the Evangelical Lutheran Augustana Synod with the cheerful word that no matter how earnestly women try to do things right they're always wrong.

"The wife of Archbishop Nathan Soderblom, who is the father of 12 children, expressed it in this way: "Women are unhappy and restive because they haven't sufficient work to keep them busy. And if they have sufficient work, it's the wrong kind."

Perhaps she is qualified to make this observation by virtue of wide experience as a charity and relief worker. Mrs. Soderblom indicated that woman is forever groping about frantically for something in life to interest her.

"Originally woman had her definite place in the industrial organization of every country," Mrs. Soderblom said. "But with changes in the economic system she was thrown out with insufficient work to keep her interested."

"Since that time every day, every phase of life woman has entered, has been an attempt on her part to find an interest in life."

"Women have been foolish. They have gone into business, attempting to compete with men on their own ground and doing things inefficiently which the most ordinary man can do well."

Women are coming to realize, the clergyman's wife said, that they must make a definite place for themselves in work which they can do better than men can do it.

"That place," she added, "is the home. We are fit to be mothers and wives. We can conduct our home life on a scientific basis and make it an interesting profession."

"Of course, there must be a social re-awakening as to the value of home. Our people most marry younger. We must get a new ideal of marriage and the value of sound homes. Women must bear children."

"But, the economic problem is great. Perhaps a subsidy from the Government for the married man is the solution."

"Perhaps an increasing scale of wages in shop and factory with the birth of each child is the solution. Society must attend to this and search for an answer."

"A vote may be a vote, but woman is forgetting that she is the aristocrat of the world."

"Here is not a ruling position but an influencing position."

"They can find proper work and plenty of it if they will but seek."

Cholera Takes Big Toll of U. S. Hogs

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Cholera killed approximately 4 per cent of the hogs on farms in the United States the last year. The bureau of animal industry announcing this estimate Friday said losses were heaviest in Iowa, Nebraska, Indiana, Missouri, Illinois, Georgia, Minnesota and South Dakota, in the order named. Each of these states it is estimated, lost more than 100,000 head from the disease. The total number of swine lost from hog cholera exceeded 2,250,000 valued at approximately \$29,392,000. The department of agriculture is urging the preventive serum treatment combined with strict sanitation and thorough disinfection of premises after outbreaks as the most effective way to control the disease.

ROAD CONDITIONS IN EASTERN OREGON

The condition of the state highways in Eastern Oregon, according to the weekly report of the State highway commission, follows:

Old Oregon Trail-East of The Dalles—Ontario - Huntington - Baker - Union - La Grande - Pendleton - Umatilla - Arlington - The Dalles: Maximum entire distance and in excellent condition except between La Grande and Union, Mosier and Hepburn Junction and between The Dalles and Deschutes River where reconstruction is under way necessitating cautious driving.

Old Oregon Trail-West of The Dalles—(Columbia River Highway Section) The Dalles - Mosier - Hood River - Cascade Locks - Portland - Scappoose - Deer Island - Astoria - Clatskanie - Astoria - Seaside: Payet entire distance.

La Grande - Joseph Highway—(Road to Wallawa Lake) La Grande - Joseph: Under construction for macadamizing; base course completed. Section through Grande Ronde Canyon now open; careful driving required north of Rhinehart bridge where traffic passes under roof bunkers.

Elgin - Minam - Wallawa - Lostine - Enterprise - Joseph: Macadamized and in excellent condition.

Joseph - Wallawa Lake: Good condition.

Baker - Cornucopia Highway—Baker - Halfway: 19 miles macadam; 21 miles graded roadbed. Balance fair county road. Now grade on lower Powder River between Love Bridge and Black Bridge now open working hours. Watch out for con-
