Famous French Recipes

Timbal Jardinieres.
Paris. (L.N.S.)—Timbales come filled with many good things in Paris. The chef of the famous Cafe Harcourt, on the noisy "Boul' Micho," makes a delicious "Timbal Jardinieres."

Boil about one-half a pound of sugar in a quart of milk flavored with vanilla and add a little tapioca. When it has cooked a little hard with three eggs and pour into a buttered pudding mold, in the center of which has been put a complete of apples which is thick. Boach in the oven. When baked remove from the timbale and garnish with candied fruits. Pour over this currant jelly and serve.



Black and White Furs

Paris. (L.N.S.)—Light-colored furs are apt to be the fashion this winter. Parisians are making quantities in their demand for furs of brighter hues, according to the heads of the largest firms of furriers.

Black and white combinations make some striking models for gowns as well as coats. Madeline puts a huge white fox fur on a black velvet gown. It stretches nearly to the waist-line and creates an impression of great nobility. Another designer puts deep white fur sleeves in a black crepe gown. Ermine will be much worn, especially in the evening, and the principal fur houses are receiving large orders for cloaks, coats and stoles made in this fur and Chinese rabbit, an imitation of ermine. There is nothing lovelier than black velvet and ermine which many of the dressmakers are using for the Russian blouse slating costume.

Graveland makes a handsome be-furrowed ermine coat for evening wear and puts deep bands of white fox on a warm gabardin wrap. The-baut makes an unusual wrap quilted with black. It is a short day-coat and a lovely white ermine has a great deep draped collar.

Francis puts black fox on a white velvet and a stunning white broad-cloth costume has a deep collar and cuffs of black marten. Many of his day dresses are trimmed with white fur. One in black moire has been exceptionally popular with a huge ermine bow with long ends where the dress fastens over one hip. Black velvet costumes have a narrow band of white fur down the front and a bit of it on the collar and cuffs.

Hats, too, have the black and white combination in fur trimmings.

Fashion Notes

Ornaments Matched.
Paris.—Ornaments are now subtly matched in the ultra fashionable costume. One young woman seen crossing the Place De La Concorde in a black velvet tail-coat today had a narrow collar. Her cloche of black moire was trimmed with a eonard white moire, and her walking stick was ebony with white enameled handle.

Torador Effect.
Paris.—A rather unexpected torador effect is obtained by one of the new drappings. Over a foundation of dyed lace, a great, fringed Spanish shawl is hung. Fastened on the right shoulder, it is caught again at the waist line under the left arm, to hang loosely and a bit unevenly, in soft folds.

Collar Not Attached.
London.—The collar is not necessarily attached to the frock these times. A costume of Chinese blue tulle with a low, black girde, has a rounded neck line. Above the neck line is a black silk collar, worn like a cloaker neckpiece, and ornamented with three small blue glass buttons.

Tailored Lingerie.
London.—Because of the straight, slim silhouettes, women are turning today from lace-trimmed lingerie to that which is rigorously tailored. For this silhouettes, radium or crepe de chine is preferred to linen.

Utility Taxes Boosted.

SALEM, Or.—Increased valuations placed on the properties of the Portland and Halway, Light & Power company by the state tax commission for the year 1924 will boost the taxes of the corporation approximately \$1,000 a day, according to Franklin T. Griffith and other officials of the company who were in Salem today. This increase in taxes would aggregate more than \$300,000 a year, Mr. Griffith said.

BAKER MII Sets Record.
RAKELI, Or.—The Baker White Pine company's sawmill here set a new record here last week when the mill cut 576,000 feet, according to Ed Meyers, superintendent. The mill runs six days of eight hours each. To keep the mill going requires 55 carloads of logs daily. These are delivered in taxes, would aggregate more than \$300,000 a year, Mr. Griffith said.
