### SAYS FAMILY ROWS BAD FOR CHILDREN

SYRACUSE, N. Y.—Parents whose quarreling and bickering result in separations and divorces are not only hurting themselves, but are forcing upon their children a moral effect which handicaps future success.

Such is the opinion of Mrs. Margaret L. Downes, Onondaga County Probation officer and authority on child training.

"The greater percentage of children who come under her supervision as 'wayward' come from homes where there is trouble between the parents, divorce, separation or constant wrangling," Mrs. Downes says.

"The death of one of the parents, particularly the father, has a decided effect, generally, upon the life of a child, including the wayward sons and daughters, but the effect is toward the child's improvement and not downfall."

Many cases have been witnessed by Mrs. Downes in which a wayward son was changed by the death of the father and rallied to the support of his mother.

"It gives an added impetus to the sense of responsibility, dormant in many cases, but which, when aroused, aids greatly to make the son or daughter a success in life," declares Mrs. Downes.

"The percentage of boys on parole making good seems to be slightly higher than that of girls on parole," says Mrs. Downes.

The Spiral Gown.

Paris, (I.N.S.)—Going up, going up! The spiral movement is the distinguishing feature of the new winter models.

It all started with the ruffle idea which was instituted by Cheruit last year. She is using it again this season, but the ruffle has become a spiral, like one of the tiny spiral staircases that are to be found in the small Parisian restaurants going to upper regions.

The tailors, in particular, are provided with the spiral movement. One of the newest models comes in black cloth with brown leather printed in a design in gold on the collar and cuffs. The ruffle begins its long winding course just above the hem in front. Like so many fall costumes, it is beltless and has a high-standing shawl collar.

There is a lovely one-piece garment of black corded woolen material with collar and cuffs trimmed in black fur. The circular movement still goes on. The spiral fold starts somewhere around the knees on the right side and mounts spirally upward to the hip on the left, first taking a dip downward, the sweep of which brings it round the back almost to the level of the starting point. It reaches its highest altitude on left hip, where it ends. It is really a dress and coat in one.

The evening dresses, too, have the spiral movement. One comes in black crepe satin, cut very straight, with a bit of draped movement going upward on the left hip. The folds are held in place by an ornament of brilliant which decorates the spiral belt starting from the hem and winding

## Famous French Recipes

### Cinnamon Tart.

Paris, (I.N.S.)—At the "Little Blue," near the old market St. Honoré, the chef makes a delicious cinnamon tart in the following manner:

Work together a half pound of flour, a quarter of a pound of butter, a half teaspoonful of salt, one-fourth pound of powdered sugar and two spoonful of cinnamon.

Do not work the mixture too much and roll it out but once about as thick as a penny. Butter a mold and line up to the waist.
