Wheat Problems May Be Solved by a Revision Production and Marketing

selective admission of a larger supply of labor.

The report discussed various proposals at length but went into more detail with regard to co-operative marketing, declaring in conclusion that even when sentiment existed for the purchase of the surplus or price fixing there was general admission that a plan contemplating orderly marketing "is an essential and fundamental factor" in arriving at a solution. In the view of the two officials it provides the only method by which the producer can avoid to any extent reliance upon the speculator, whom the report described as the "key man" in the industry at present.

Local Taxes Heavy Burden.
Discussing the depression among the wheat farmers, the report said the local tax burden was one of the chief causes of complaint because it added materially to production costs. The scarcity and high cost of labor were cited as fundamental factors while freight charges develop another vital problem accentuating the producers' troubles.

In connection with the tax question, the report said the privilege accorded states, counties and municipalities of selling tax exempt securities has encouraged them to make extravagant expenditures. The tax exempt securities are finding ready sale through higher brackets of the federal income surtaxes encouraging investors to place money in them. Abolishment of the tax exempt securities and reduction of the higher income surtaxes therefore, the directors felt would aid the farmer by reducing his local tax assessments.

Big Profit Disappears

Regarding the "profit" of \$58,000,000 made by the grain corporation, the officials said they had no accurate information. The report said there seemed to be a widespread opinion that much profit was made but where it is or how it could be distributed among the farmers it is not known. Price fixing appeared to have more opponents than advocates, according to the report, but with regard to the proposal that the government purchase "surplus" production a different situation was said to exist. Supporters of the latter plan state it "in very simple terms," the report said, adding "it is of course by no means as simple as it appears," and likely would subject the American government to charges of dumping the product into world markets. The officials pointed out that this government had sought to protect itself from that sort of thing through a rigid anti-dumping act and they believed a policy of dumping abroad would bring serious reactions.

'COVERED WAGON' DRAWS BIG CROWD

Seating Capacity in Baker Theater Stretched to Care for Those Seeing Great Drama.

Like a story from the lips of Uncle Dunham Wright sitting before the fireplace with his little grandchild upon his knee, telling of the trials, hardships with now and then fun and frolic intermingled, was the great picture known as "The Covered Wagon," presented last evening at the Baker Theatre.

Emerson Hough, the author, sensed the frontier days in a remarkable manner. He took from history's pages the choicest bits of action, of life, of romance and wound them into a beautiful story of the plains. Molly Wingate was the beautiful girl character whose hand was sought by a booby Missourian named Woodhull, and also by the dapper and gallant young Will Banion. The usual picture show fight ensued but was a good fight with Banion winner.

Jesse Wingate, captain of the original wagon train, proved himself a strong character. At Fort Hall where the road forks—one going to "California" where the gold rush was on in 1849, and the other to Oregon where every man could get a section of good land free—old Jesse made a speech showing the oratory of present day Bill Borah in his pleadings for all to go to Oregon.

But the lure of the gold fields split the wagon train and a goodly portion went into California while Molly and her parents located in Oregon only to be followed a few years later by Will Banion, whose name had been cleared in the meantime from the stigma of cattle stealing and who had also grown rich in the mines. Naturally the play closes with Molly and Will under a beautiful Oregon moon planning their wedding while the little brother turns a tune on the family banjo he brought across the plains, chewing his long green tobacco between strokes on the strings.

On Wednesday morning the "World Service Volume" will be concluded, in addition the topic "Henderson to team work," "Epworth League Institute," "Finance" and a report from the "Findings" Committee will be taken up and thoroughly discussed. Tonight at 8:20 the Brotherhood of the church will sit down to a great banquet for the men of the congregation and their friends. The visiting pastors will be the guests of the local men at this banquet, which will be served in the basement of the Methodist church by the Ladies Aid Society of the church.

A fine musical and literary program will be furnished the banqueters. The main address of the evening will be given by Dr. Ewing the District Superintendent. Local speakers on the program are to be announced at the banquet.

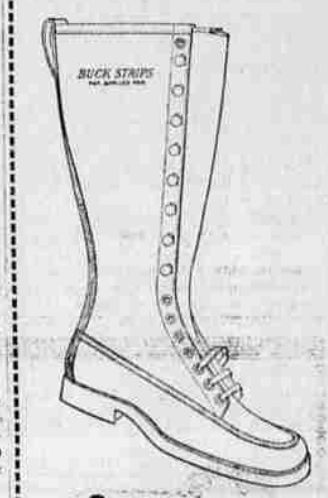
