Mrs. W. W. Rogers and daughter left Saturday for Olathe, Oregon, where they will visit Mr. Rogers, who is employed there.

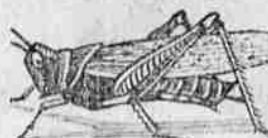
Miss Jean Workman left Saturday morning for a few days' visit with friends in Baker.
