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bed in the sand. Rocks were piled on the body when found, and the action of the water had worn away the flesh on the skull, and hands and the legs leaving the torso only partially whole. Even the clothing was almost gone.

Some Clothing Found

Enough clothing remained, however, to make it appear that the body had been dressed in a mackinaw, a blue vest and overalls with women's garments underneath. The skeleton indicated that the person had been large and heavy. Small pieces of lead pencils, an old razor and a small pocket mirror were the only things found in the clothing. The teeth were in good condition, some being missing from the left side, but whether the teeth were removed before death or by the action of the water since the body was placed in the river, the coroner declared he could not form an opinion.

Body Buried on Bank

Interment of the remains was made on the banks of the river not far from the scene of the discovery. A jury called by the coroner, gave it as its opinion that the unknown person had come to death at the hands of persons unknown by violence.

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power shortage. The machinery installed is of latest design in every respect, and required all of this summer for construction.

With the new 1000 kilowatt unit in operation, the old 400 unit will be retired from regular service but will be maintained for emergencies so that if trouble should come, it will be ready to pick up the load, and keep a constant supply of power available for all customers.

Steam for the new Curtis turbine is at present being supplied by the old boilers but when the brick work on the new Sterling water tube boiler, of 250 horsepower capacity, is dry, a still more powerful supply of steam will be available to turn the new equipment over a capacity.

A Dutch oven type furnace will burn sawmill refuse in the most efficient way, and the smokestack standing 145 feet from the furnace floor, will draw a terrific blast through the boiler.

Increasing the efficiency of the steam turbine, there is an Ingersoll Rand barometric condenser, which stands high in the air and is cooled by a steady stream of water pumped through it. This is a complicated piece of machinery in itself.

A new switchboard to care for the electrical current generator has been installed. This part of the new plant is a complete mystery to the layman, but the electrical engineers assigned the inspection party, that every wire was needed. The outdoor substation is another complicated electrical installation. This is equipped with three 400 K. V. A. transformers which step up the generated current from 2300 volts to 23,000 volts in which condition the current is carried on the mile and one half of new transmission line to the Baker sub-station, where it is delivered to the main system. Lightning arrestors protect the installation, an electrical equipment is a very strong conductor of lightning.

As the new unit automatically regulates with the power demand, much of the system regulating will be done from the South Baker location, but the load dispatching will still be carried on from the Rock Creek hydro-electric plant, west of Baker.

"IN LAWS" BARRED IN HUSBAND'S WILL

HOUSTON, Texas, (INS)—Because he considered his wife's family "meddlesome," Tom Randolph stipulated in his will that in the event she chose to live with her family following his death the \$350,000 estate will be removed from her jurisdiction and her income limited to \$200 a month.

"Because of the fact that I believe in my mind that my wife's family connections were virtually responsible for our separation and because of their continual meddling in our personal affairs I have deemed it wise to include such provisions," the will reads.

By living apart from her family, the will states, Mrs. Randolph must live in another city. Visits are not taboo, but during the time of any visit with the family, the will explains, the income is reduced automatically to \$200 per month.
