Telephone Co. Fires All Employees Who Cannot Save

ADILENE, Kan. (INS)—Save or step out!

Bolled down to final stages of brevity, this is the creed of the United Power and Telephone Company of Adilene, by which all its employees from the office boy up must abide.

Cleveland L. Brown, president of the company, is responsible for the unique third plan. He compels his workers to save at least 10 per cent of their earnings in safely chartered investments that bring an equitable cash return.

The measure was adopted not because the firm feared particularly low the employees disposed of their salaries, but in the interest of efficiency, according to Brown.

"I put the system into operation only after it was found through a survey that a majority of my employees were losing in efficiency because they were in debt or spent more than they earned," the owner said.

The plan, according to its instigator, has proved highly successful. Figures compiled by Brown show \$225,000 of wages distributed during the first year was invested in a variety of reliable stocks.

Under the ruling money applied toward the liquidation of debt is considered a saving, as does money applied as a sinking fund against the principal of a debt on a home.

Burns invested in automobiles, phonographs and home chests are not recognized under terms of this third scheme.

Strict adherence to the rule is established through a savings director, the result being that no employee can continue drawing his salary without presentation of bona fide evidence he has saved at least 10 per cent of the previous week's income.

Bulgarian City Raises Money

FOR SCHOOLS BY SUBSCRIPTION
APPO, Bulgaria, (AP)—Because of the lack of funds on account of its heavy expenditures for reparations and other post-war purposes, this city is building the necessary additional school accommodations by public subscription.

The subscriptions are being paid in the form of money and building materials of various kinds. Thus far more than 500,000 leva have been contributed in cash and material, and the subscription campaign is being actively pushed by citizens' committees.

Recently the local board of education laid with an elaborate civic ceremony the foundation stone of a primary school in the "Strandja" quarter.

Both in the collection of funds and in the actual labor of school building, the school children of both sexes are taking an active part.

CLIFFORD FORESEES REHABILITATION OF INJURED WORKMEN

SEERKANE, Wash. (AP)—Rehabilitation of workmen injured in industry as a means toward conserving manpower at the state will probably be the next step in development of the workmen's compensation act in Washington, according to Edward Clifford, director of the department of labor and industries.

"That this work can be done without any additional expense to the state department, is the belief of Director Clifford although he added, 'It may be necessary to secure some modifications of existing statutes before a complete program can be adopted.' Conservation of manpower is urgent, Clifford said, owing to greater industrial development in the state and because of restriction of immigration and depletion of the ranks of labor as a result of the war.

Present plans of the department include the application of part or all of the payment for permanent disability toward the training of the beneficiaries in new occupations suited to their mental attainments and physical condition. For certain classes of training, Mr. Clifford said, the schools will be asked to co-operate with the department.
