CONDITION OF JEWS IMPROVES IN EUROPE

NEW YORK, (AP) — What is called the collapse of anti-Semitic agitation in the United States, and the fact no attempt on any considerable scale was made during the past year to revive this propaganda, has had a "most salutary effect in minimizing anti-Jewish activities in Europe," according to the sixteenth annual report of the American Jewish Committee made public here. The report credits the collapse of the anti-Jewish propaganda to the vigorous protests of the press, the church, and other American organs of public opinion.

Louis Marshall of New York is president of the committee, whose members include many of the most prominent Jews in America. The report was prepared by its executive committee, which includes Albert D. Lasker, Julius Rosenberg and General Abel Davis of Chicago, Oscar S. Straus, Abram L. Ekus, Justice Levine Lechman, Cyrus L. Subberger, Louis L. Strass, and Mr. Marshall of New York, Dr. Cyrus Adler and Horace Stern of Philadelphia, Felix Fold of Newark, N. J., A. Leo Weil of Pittsburgh, A. C. Batschky of Boston, Colonel Isaac M. Ullman of New Haven, and Paul L. Weiss of Cleveland.

The past two years have seen a noticeable improvement in the condition of the Jews in Eastern and Central Europe, according to the report, "although in many lands oppression, persecution and invidious discrimination still prevail. Even there a reasonable hope for eventual if not speedy betterment is justified."

"Iniquitous anti-Semitic propaganda on the whole, has met with general condemnation in western Europe except in Germany where anti-Semitism has been adopted as a rallying cry by a number of minor political groups and especially those of reactionary tendencies. It is evident from their proceedings that anti-Semitism is the hand-maiden of the broken remnants of militarism and Junkerdom and of those forces which are bent on overthrowing the republic and of combatting free and liberal government."

"With anti-Semitism discredited in the more enlightened countries of the world, it cannot long survive in central and eastern Europe."

"The improvement in the economic, political and spiritual condition of the

Jews due to post-war reconstruction, is also evidenced by the falling off of Jewish immigration to the United States, the report continues. Some monthly quotas for Poland and other countries were not filled, and although this may partly be explained by lack of means to make the trip, the betterment of conditions generally has had much to do with it, although in Poland "political conditions have much to be desired."

"There has been a tremendous revival of cultural life in Poland, Roumania, and to a lesser extent, in Latvia," according to the report. "The number of Jewish schools is increasing by leaps and bounds, old schools are being rebuilt and new ones established, modern text books are being published in many places, new publications are springing up, and even

the theatre, that unmistakable concomitant of normal life, is again coming into its own."

"In every country with the exception of Russia, Poland, Hungary and Latvia, the government is encouraging this renaissance of intellectual life among the Jewish masses."

Every state created by the Peace Conference is endeavoring to honor the letter and spirit of the Minority Rights guarantees, with the exception of Austria, Latvia, Poland, and to a much lesser extent, Roumania. The report concludes, Lithuania is singled out as being "consistently progressive" in safeguarding the rights of its minorities.

Darren Bests Minkind in Bout at Salt Lake. SALT LAKE, (AP) — Frankie Darren of Loma, Utah, champion of the Utah Junior welterweight title, out-fought Abie Minkind of Salt Lake in six fast rounds here Monday night. Darren had Abie on the go in every round except the first, when things were about even.

In other contests, Battling Aekman, Iowa heavyweight, knocked out Roy McCarthy in one round; Battling Meeky, local heavyweight, made Sam Davis, negro, quit in one round, and Kid Love, colored, lightweight, was awarded the decision over Bill Rogers.
