Famous French Recipes

Souffle A la Indienne.

Paris, (I.N.S.)—Just off the Grand Boulevard is a little restaurant where one can vary French cooking with dishes "a la Indienne."

For soufflé the natives eat it cooked as much as needed with sugar and milk for one-half an hour. With the aid of a whipper reduce to a thick mass over the fire. Try to make it as smooth and creamy as possible. Continue beating and bind with the yolks of three eggs. Mix with this cream a little pineapple and lemon juice with the whites of three eggs beaten into a stiff snow. Bake for ten minutes in a hot oven. Serve in soufflé timbales.
