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Later, according to the testimony, Edwards and Houser D. Martin, a guard at the governor's residence during the stress of the recent statewide martial law routine, were commissioned as officers in the Oklahoma national guard on orders of the executive and drew salaries as such although neither had passed the military examination or subscribed to the required oath.

Edwards, state auditor, the first witness identified warrants issued to Edwards and Martin. On cross examination, children said that he did not know the signature of either of the men but that each warrant bore an endorsement in the name of the man to whom it was issued. Commissioner Neill detailed the alleged visit to his office at which Governor Walton attempted to have Edwards placed on the highway department payroll. Neill testified that the executive asked him if he "could take care of two or three of my friends" and named Edwards as one of the number. The witness said he refused, telling the governor that such procedure would be a violation of the law.

Says Davenport Agreed.

Governor Walton then stepped to a telephone nearby, the commissioner testified, and made arrangements with Doctor Davenport to place Edwards on the health department payroll.

As the governor turned from the telephone, he made some remark about that being the way he liked for his appointees to help him, Neill told the court.

J. C. Maher, a federal employee attached to the health department, testified he did not know Edwards as being on the health department staff. Adj. Gen. B. H. Marchant then took the stand and testified that both Edwards and Martin were members of the national guard. He said they had been appointed on orders from Governor Walton. Asked if Edwards had rendered any service to the guard, the adjutant general replied he had not served the guard "directly." He said that on request of the governor, Edwards had been assigned to the executive office. He declared that neither Edwards, who was commissioned a major, nor Martin, who was made a lieutenant, had taken the examination or had been sworn in regularly.

FIRE DESTROYS
HAINES 'RECORD'

Haines, Ore., Newspaper Plant Is Complete Loss Though Partly Covered by Insurance.

BAKER—The printing plant of the Haines Record published at Haines is a complete loss as a result of a fire at 2 o'clock this morning which burned the plant and building. The loss to the plant and paper stock is placed at \$200 by E. O. Wooley, editor, partially covered by insurance. The building is a complete loss. The business was owned jointly by Mr. and Mrs. Wooley.

The fire had gained such headway when discovered that it is hard to determine the origin, according to Mr. Wooley. He states, however, it is thought to have been caused by a short circuit of the electrical wiring, though not defective wiring. Mr. Wooley stated today that the phone wires were tampered with by Haines "pranksters" and that he believed other wiring loosened in some manner, resulting in the short circuiting and the fire.

Mr. Wooley stated today that he would install a new printing plant as soon as a location could be secured. In the meantime the Record will be printed in the Baker Herald plant.

Government Forecasts
Year's Yield of Crops

WASHINGTON (AP)—Preliminary estimates of this year's harvest, announced Thursday by the department of agriculture, placed the corn crop at 3,929,192,000 bushels, compared with a forecast of 3,921,454,000 bushels a month ago and a crop of 2,890,712,000 bushels last year.

Other crops were estimated as follows:

Wheat, 751,737,000 bushels; oats, 1,262,453,000 bushels; barley, 199,251,000 bushels; rye, 64,774,000 bushels; buckwheat, 14,511,000 bushels; potatoes, 418,722,000 bushels; sweet potatoes, 37,429,000 bushels; hay, 162,914,000 tons; tobacco, 1,456,728,000 pounds; flax seed, 19,342,000 bushels.

Rice, 22,727,000 bushels; peaches, 45,555,000 bushels; pears, 15,335,000 bushels; apples, 193,855,000 bushels; sugar beets, 6,667,000 tons; grain sorghum, 105,566,000 bushels; cranberries, 619,000 barrels; beans, 14,284,000 bushels; cowpeas, 16,094,000 bushels; cabbage, 821,000 tons; broom corn, 65,000 tons; sorghum syrup, 22,642,000 gallons; clover seed, 1,121,000 bushels; peanuts, 617,589,000 pounds; hops, 17,025,000 pounds.
