Mary's claim to age and purity of stock is verified by local pioneers, who point out that the original Wasco tribe has now been entirely assimilated, either by intermarriage with other tribes or by death. She was born in 1810, and was a girl in her teens when the first white men came to the mid-Columbia.

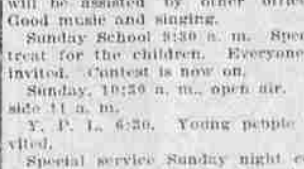

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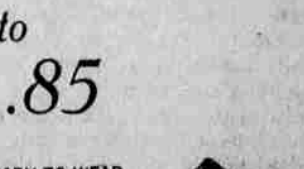
