NEWPORT, Wash. (AP)—Valuable timber lands, one section of which contains over 11,000,000 board feet of white pine and better than 10,000 cedar poles have been discovered by timber cruisers in Pend Oreille county. The cruise is being conducted by the county on the theory that much timber land is assessed at only a fraction of its real value.

The particular stand reported besides showing a high grade of white pine contains more than 10,000,000 board feet of other types of timber, the cruising party announced. It is located about six miles from Priest lake and is assessed at \$8000.

Famous French Recipes

Ravioli.
Paris. (U.S.S.)—Thursday is the day for ravioli at Puccardi's Italian restaurant in the heart of Paris.

The French housewife buys her ravioli already prepared with the fowl stuffing at one of the best delicatessen shops.

Put the required amount into boiling water with a little salt and let cook ten or fifteen minutes. Drain, add a large piece of butter in a casserole and then add a large spoonful of concentrated tomato and the same quantity of soft meat jelly and a little salt and pepper.

When all is well mixed add some grated parmesan or gruyere cheese and turn with a wooden spoon to form a smooth cream. Put the ravioli in a serving dish and pour over the cream sauce, taking care not to break the little "envelopes."

Discount Apple Pudding.
Paris. (U.S.S.)—The thrifty French housewife is forever thinking up ways to utilize the scraps. With the broken up bits of biscuits which she buys at half price in the shops or with the bits left in the bottom of her biscuit tin, she concocts this good apple pudding.

Put into a casserole a quarter of a pound of the broken biscuits. Pour over them about one pint of milk heated with a little sugar. Mix over the fire. Then add about one-half pound of "reineette" apples, peeled and cut into small dice, and steamed with butter and sugar.

Remove from the fire and add the yolks of three eggs and one-fourth of a pound of melted butter. At the last moment add to the mixture the whites of three eggs stiffly beaten. Put two-thirds full a mold that is buttered and powdered with bread crumbs. Bake slowly in the oven over boiling water. Let stand a few moments before taking from the mold and serve warm.

AVALON, Calif. (AP)—A Santa Catalina island hill-top overlooking Avalon bay is to be planted with geraniums as a memorial to former President Harding, according to plans announced by William Wrigley, Jr., owner of the island. Fifteen acres on the hill will be kept covered with red blooms. President Harding's fatal illness prevented a visit he was to have made to Avalon at the end of his tour to the Pacific Coast.
