BRITISH YOUTH IS BRANDED INDOLENT

LONDON.—Scathing indictment of the manner in which the present-day English youth draws the "dole" in preference to work is made by the Middlesex Education Committee on the juvenile unemployment problem.

It was proposed recently to make it compulsory for every out-of-work boy and girl to attend having to forfeit their unemployment "dole."

The committee now reports that rather than attend school and "do some semblance of work" more than a hundred youngsters of both sexes in one center alone forfeited their right to draw unemployment pay.

"Youths told us, when having the school clause pointed out to them, that it was 'too much like work,'" says the committee in its report.

"The vast majority who have the elementary schools at the age of 14 suffer from absolute idleness," continues the committee. "All the boys seem to think about is 'roadwork' and smoking cheap cigarettes, while the girls chief interest seems to be walking about the streets until they find a youth willing to buy them a seat at the movies. Their minds are blank incapable of continued intelligent application, and consequently ready to respond to any call of idleness."

Many of the other centers for juvenile unemployment teaching register the same findings. Boys at one school assumed that they would be allowed to smoke and swear. All seem to be unanimous that with the present day youth idleness is preferred to work."

Contractors Held Guilty Of Violating Anti-Trust Act

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A group of prominent building contractors of San Francisco Oakland and San Jose Cal. were held guilty of a violation of the Sherman anti-trust act in their operation of a permit system of obtaining of supplies from outside the state, in a decision handed down by United States District Judge Maurice T. Deering Friday, in a civil action to dissolve the alleged builders' combine and enjoin the permit system.

Business Depression Causes Romanian Factories to Close
 BUCHAREST, Romania, (AP)—Despite the natural resources of wealth, Romania today is in the midst of an acute economic crisis. A local newspaper, Universal, says "the internal situation is grave, especially in relation to economic and financial affairs."

Large industrial enterprises, even including the oil interests, are reducing their working forces at the approach of winter. Factories are closing because they find difficulty in collecting the payments due them, and the export of wheat has been reduced to negligible proportions, in spite of recent efforts of the government to stimulate exportation.

One reason for the existing situation is the low purchasing value of the lei, which has fallen lower than the currency of any of the Balkan states.

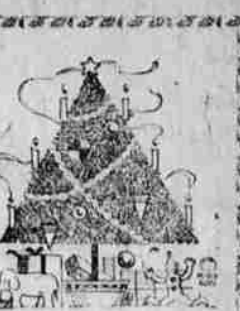
