More Autos On Farms And In Small Towns Than in The Larger Cities, Report

WASHINGTON.—How you would keep 'em down on the farm?

That's easy, explains the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, which reports that proportionately more cars are owned in the farm and village than in the city.

The ownership of motor cars is proportionately heavier in the villages than in the cities.

which have but nine per cent of the United States population, yet use 20 per cent of the total motor cars, according to the chamber. "Stating it another way, these communities have one motor car for every 34.4 persons, or 229 cars per 1000 persons."

Then the chamber modifies this statement by pointing out that while "it is true the farmer owns 20 per cent of the automobiles and is by far the heaviest single user of motor transportation, he constitutes 44.1 per cent of the population."

Farmers Need Cars.

Numerous factors contribute to the intensive use of the motor in rural districts, notably the need of fast transportation to annihilate great dis-

tances from the farm to the city. "No occupation gets more value out of the motor car," the chamber says. "There are other points, however, to be taken into consideration, such as income and roads. Since much of the farmer's income is in elements other than cash, it is difficult to make a comparative study on this basis. The rural highway situation, though, is rapidly improving, as is evidenced by the fact that federal, state and local road construction is going ahead at the rate of more than 20,000 miles per year."

In an interesting analysis of cities of various sizes, the chamber reports:

"The density of motor cars to population decreases as the towns increase in size. For instance, cities between 5,000 and 25,000 have 150 motor cars per thousand, as compared with 229 in the 1,000 to 5,000 class. The cities ranging from 25,000 to 100,000 have 115.5 cars per thousand persons, and the largest cities, those over 100,000 have 54 cars per thousand."

"In the corn belt and wheat states, also in California, one finds a very high percentage of motor cars on the farms, as, for instance, in Iowa and Nebraska, where there are more than 150 of these vehicles for every thousand persons."

East's Ratio Low.

"In the Middle Atlantic states, where there are many of the largest cities having a high percentage of industrial workers who live within the crowded city limits, the ratio of cars in municipalities is low. Conversely, the farm ownership of cars in this territory is fairly high due to the productivity of the farming land, the degree to which highways have been improved, and the extent to which city markets call for local transportation in such uses as market gardening and dairy products."

South Dakota outranks all states in the use of cars in cities of more than 1,000 population, with 228 cars per thousand persons. Closely following are California, 224; Arizona, 220; Iowa, 218; and Kansas, 212. Rhode Island is the lowest in this class with only 65.4 cars per thousand persons.

Rhode Island Leads.

On farms and towns under 1,000 population, however, Rhode Island tops the list, with 728 cars per thousand persons, followed by Massachusetts, 355; Nebraska, 150; Iowa, 150.8; and South Dakota, 149.3. Alabama trails with but 15.5 cars per thousand persons.

In this connection, the chamber declares, however, that some of the territory included as "town" (township), in Rhode Island and Massachusetts population census is classified as rural in other states.

Pacific states lead the sectional classification in cities over 1000 with 226.2 cars per thousand persons, followed by West North Central states, with 206, and Mountain States, with 133.

In farms and towns under 1,000 population, the West North Central states, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North and South Dakota, top the list, with 121.4 cars per thousand. Pacific states are second, 115.5, and East North Central, Wisconsin, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin third, with 100 cars per thousand.

Total passenger cars registration is estimated by the chamber to be 16,769,409, or 3.3 persons per car throughout the country.

Heaviest state registrations, including cities and farms are:

New York, 811,145; California, 753,246; Ohio, 728,271; Pennsylvania, 717,966 and Illinois, 686,991.

Apple Duty Removed.

HOOD RIVER, Ore.—A cabbage is received today by the Apple Growers' association from its London conference advising that the British government was seriously contemplating levying a duty of 2 shillings a hundredweight, or 55 cents a box against importations of American apples.

Such a tax, it was said, would prohibit shipment of American boxed and barreled apples to the United Kingdom, now the chief export market of Oregon apple growers.

The proposed tax law, it was said, followed a conference of members of various provinces in London. Canadian and Australian orchardists, it was said, are seeking the tax as a protection for their imports to the motor country. P. E. Clark, sales manager of the association, said that he believes enough opposition to the proposed preliminary law will materialize to prevent its passage.

Business Block for Astoria.

ASTORIA, Ore.—Work was commenced today on driving the piling for the foundation of the four-story business block to be erected by the Warren Higgins Niumi interests of Twelfth street, extending from Commercial to Duane. The structure will cost about \$725,000. Announcement was also made today that E. F. Wenzelbach is to erect a three-story hotel building on Duane street to cost between \$40,000 and \$50,000.
