WASHINGTON (AP). — A "conspiracy to encompass my destruction by means of perjury, subordination of perjury and suppression of material facts and documents" was charged by Charles R. Forbes, former director of the veterans bureau, in testimony given today before the senate committee.

RUMORS SAY KAISER WILL MAKE RETURN

Wilhelm Planning on Returning to Germany, Reports State

JOURNAL SEES HIM ON THRONE DEC. 4

Allied Council Takes No Action on Prince's Flight —Wilhelm's Family Has 12 Passports.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Coolidge said that the United States would not protest against the return of the ex-crown prince, the ex-kaiser of the re-establishment of the German monarchy.

BERLIN (AP)—Official denial was made today that former Emperor Wilhelm had been authorized to return to Germany.

LONDON, (AP)—The British government officials profess to be satisfied that Holland will not permit ex-Emperor William to leave the Dutch custody. They say they have no reason to suppose the former-war lord proposed to decamp, and if he had such intentions they were confident that the Dutch government would frustrate the attempt.

BAKER MEN IN CITY SUNDAY

George W. Miller and A. V. Swift Visit La Grande; Discuss Presidential Possibilities.

George W. Miller and A. V. Swift, of Baker county, spent Sunday in La Grande visiting former friends and transacting some business while in this city.

Mr. Swift, who is a Baker county farmer, and has traveled extensively during the past few months, has probed into political and agricultural conditions as they exist today, and is of the opinion, along with Mr. Miller, that Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania, as president of the United States would go a long way toward alleviating the troubles of the farmers and the nation as a whole.

Late News Flashes

America Will Not Help WASHINGTON (AP).—Although the door is still open for American helpfulness in the reparations problem, the president regards the latest moves in that direction as having come definitely to an end.

To Probe Germany's Ability to Pay. PARIS (AP).—The allied reparations commission decided today to hear Germany's representatives regarding the capacity of the reich to pay reparations. The hearing date will be fixed later. The French chamber deputies today passed a vote of confidence in the Poincare government by a vote of 379 to 165.

A Step Toward Lowering Taxes WASHINGTON (AP).—Without committing himself either to approval or disapproval of the treasury tax revision program, President Coolidge today let it be known that he regards the proposal as a step toward opening the way for meeting the demand of the country for lower taxes.

Prominent Reno Banker Found Dead. RENO, Nev. (AP).—M. D. Fairchild, vice president and cashier of the Stockgrowers bank, was found dead in an automobile a few miles from town today. He was shot through the body. Murder is suspected.
