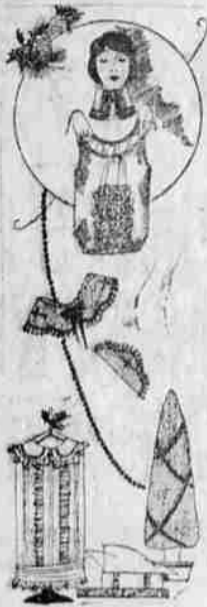

AVALON, Cal. (AP)—Harry A. Williams, sports writer of Los Angeles, Monday was elected president of the Pacific Coast Baseball league in place of William H. McCarthy.

LOS ANGELES AUTO CLASSIC WILL FIND CHAMPION OF 1923

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The annual 250-mile Thanksgiving day race at the Los Angeles Speedway Nov. 23, will decide the 1923 American Automobile Association drivers' championship, according to members of the association's contest board.

Eddie Hearne, 1915 national champion, and Jimmy Murphy, winner of the title last year, have a chance to win the championship this year. Hearne, because of the number of points he already has scored, would win the championship by placing anywhere ahead of Murphy in the race. Murphy, however, to take the title, would have to win the race with Hearne placing third or better.

Other drivers who are expected to enter the race, which will be run laps around the mile and a quarter bowl, include Tommy Milton, Earl Cooper, Harlan Fonger, Harry Harts, H. C. (COT) Durant, Kenneth Hill, Ralph De Palma, Jerry Wainwright, and Frank Elliott.

A. M. Young, secretary-manager of the speedway, is confident that the world record of 114.5 miles an hour for 250 miles, established by Murphy, will be threatened, and that last year's attendance mark of 30,000 will be shattered.

Park Site Offered Sale.

SALEM, Ore.—Thomas E. Kay, member of the lower house of the legislature, today offered to deed to the city of Salem five acres of land adjoining the Englewood school grounds, providing the municipality will use the land for a park. Acceptance of the gift also is conditioned upon the city paying two blocks of street, connecting the site with other hard-surfaced roads.

Union Beats Hilber 28 to 6. UNION, (Special)—In the first game of an Armistice Day double-header, Union high football team had little difficulty in downing the Hilber aggregation, coached by Ralph Morgan, formerly Union's mentor. The Maroon and White eleven scored twice in the first quarter and pushed another touchdown over in the second. Hilber braced then and carried the ball about 50 yards on rushes and passes to within Union's ten-yard line but were unable to put it over. Union was like a stone wall under the onslaught of their goal posts. The first half ended Union 19, Hilber 9.

Hilber Scores. In the third period Union continued their successful onslaught on the visiting team. In the fourth period, with the count 21 to 6 against them, Spiers, of Hilber, nailed a Union forward pass and sprinted 60 yards to a touchdown. Hilber failed to convert. One more score for Union left the final score: Union 25, Hilber 6.

Union displayed consistent defense, excepting against the aerial offense of Hilber, and seemed to gain at will against the visitors. Union will meet La Grande high school in the second game between the two schools this fall at Union (this Saturday).

Wallowa Wins Championship. WALLOWA, (Special)—Wallowa high school won the county championship of Wallowa county Armistice day at Enterprise, defeating the light and trible eleven coached by Amerson 16 to 12 in a game fraught with drama and surprises. Invariably when the two schools meet in the championship contest, a grilling battle of exciting interest occurs and yesterday was no exception.

Wallowa, heavier and with an end run that was hard to stop, swept the lighter Enterprise team off their feet. Enterprise scored twice, mainly relying on trick plays and passes to make their gains.

Powder Beats Union Seconds. UNION, (Special)—In a game that for sheer excitement and see-saw leadership was hard to beat, North Powder high school first team yesterday defeated Union high school second team 23 to 25. Highlights of the game was the apparent east with which both teams scored and a 60-yard rambuck of a kickoff for a touchdown by a North Powder man. The first quarter ended with North Powder leading 12 to 0. In the sec-

ond quarter Union scored, and repeated twice in the third quarter while Powder gained one touchdown. The third quarter ended with Union leading 20 to 12. In the final period, with the field darkened almost to oblivion, both teams scored frequently.

Radio Club Formed. GRANTS PASS, Or.—A radio club is being organized by enthusiasts of the city. The main purpose of the organization at the present time will be the elimination of interference which on many occasions has rendered local receiving sets absolutely useless. The club members will look into the source of the disturbance and if possible eliminate it so that the radio programmes of the coast may be enjoyed. The interference extends for a radius of some two miles from Grants Pass and appears to be the result of the operation of some sort of electrical machine.
