McCarthy Will Fight Ouster By "Big Five"

Will Not Give Up Reins of Pacific Coast League, Latest Development.

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—W. W. McCarthy, ousted president of the Pacific Coast League, left Tuesday for his home in San Francisco, with the announced intention to defend himself from his office inside the golden gate. McCarthy declared that he would make the vote of the "big five" at Monday's annual meeting of the California league, which Harry W. Whitman, Los Angeles, majority winner, was elected to succeed him and to league headquarters were ordered transferred from 2015 Pine to 2010 Los Angeles. The deposed leader declared that he still had in his possession and would keep the league records and the funds and that he would carry the fight to the last ditch. Whitman's proposed plan to open league headquarters here, fringed by the Los Angeles, Salt Lake, Portland, Seattle and Oakland clubs, which elected him president. McCarthy is supported by the San Francisco, Sacramento and Vernon clubs.

THRICE WED AT 21, WINS BIGAMY CASE

ATLANTA, Ga. (INS)—Blond and beautiful Mrs. Margaret Brinkman, who, at the age of 21, is credited with having married three husbands, appeared in the Superior Court here recently on a charge of bigamy, filed by her second husband.

The young woman, according to evidence, married at the age of 18 a man named John McCord. A child was born of the union, but soon afterward the youthful mother received information which led her to believe McCord was dead. Minutes afterward McCord did not show up, so she married Len Powers.

A short time afterwards the startling news came that McCord was still living. The young woman immediately left Powers, at the same time threatening suit for divorce against McCord's estate being granted. But instead of going back to either of her former husbands she chose to take unto herself a third protector, a Blain Brinkman, of Atlanta.

In the trial Powers, the second husband, attempted to institute a charge of bigamy because the woman had married him while still wedded to her first husband. Retorting the evidence the jury held that the original marriage to McCord was void because the bride was only 17 years old at the time, below the age at which a woman may consent to marriage. The bigamy charge is.

German Brand Paper Money Picturing Goethe a Sacrilege BERLIN, (AP)—Dr. Hauer director of the Frankfurt Goethe Museum, says it is sacrilege to print Goethe's picture on the utmost valuable paper money. Frankfurt recently issued a two-million mark note bearing the famous German poet's portrait, and

similar money had been issued by other German cities. When Goethe was prime minister of the little dukedom of Sax-Weimar he strongly opposed the issuance of paper money and one to say, "Paper money scuttles at first the silver and then itself" in Parma. Diamond Mining Flourishes

LONDON, (AP)—The alluvial diamond industry in British Guiana, the only British possession in the South American continent, is showing great expansion, says a colonial report.

The output of diamonds rose from 567,200 stones weighing 102,002 carats of a total value of \$1,545,000 in 1921, to 518,557 stones weighing 152,430 carats value \$4,182,000 in 1922. The increased output attracted the attention of diamond dealers in Europe and America, with the result that between 20 and 25 foreign diamond buyers opened places of business in the colony, causing a rapid advance in prices.

CONVICTS SEE THEATERS AND RIDE IN CARS

Pennsylvania Man Arrested While Supposed To Be in County Jail

"Stone walls do not a prison make, Nor iron bars a cage." By W. B. Brown, International News Service Staff Correspondent.

HARRISBURG, Pa.—"Prisoners" sent up from Dauphin County, Pa., where it is located Philadelphia, believe they have just cause for complaint.

"The authorities are on the verge of urging them to give up their motor cars and cease calling on girls and attending the theatre in the evening."

"The first thing we know they'll be locking us up," said one indignantly. "The county maintains its bastille in the heart of Harrisburg's business district. It has barred windows, iron grated entrances and even a 28-foot wall around the structure. It has in fact everything to impress exiles. But the county also maintains a home for the penniless and aged, which has first class accommodations and good food. It is surrounded by a fertile farm where those who are able may work to relieve the mountain of life in the "county home."

In recent years it has been the custom to send some prisoners to the county home that they might do chores and assist in raising the crops.

Recently it was learned that to be assigned to the almshouse was little short of a "vacation." There are no guards. Neither are entrances and exits locked and barred.

The first time conditions were publicly revealed was when a man sentenced to thirty days there found his love of yachting stronger than his attachment to the institution. Each night he attended the show at a nearby park. However his habit was discovered and the privilege inconspicuously revoked.

But the real "knockout" was discovered when a man serving a sentence for driving an automobile while intoxicated was arrested and held without bail on the same charge because half of his original term had expired.

Frank Baschore's carelessness was the cause of the investigation. Baschore was arrested several times because he liked to speed his automobile while "under the influence." The first time he was fined \$5 and sentenced to one month in jail. Less than a month after his release he was again arrested on the same charge. That time he was sentenced to pay \$100 fine and serve three months in jail.

Shortly after being sent to jail Baschore was transferred to the almshouse. In less than 30 days a man who answers to Baschore's description was arrested by the police while riding at full speed at a busy corner. The man said he was Frank Baschore and admitted the auto from which he had taken was his. But the police were unwilling to believe it was the same Frank Baschore they had arrested twice on the same charge. They referred to their records and found the Baschore was serving three months in jail. Identification established beyond doubt he was the same man. The magistrate who heard the case decided to hold him without bail on the latest offense and wait until the court straightened out the last jail sentence. Baschore is again in jail.

It also was learned that Theodore Magrelli, who was sentenced to six months for defrauding an insurance company, occupied quarters much the same as the steward of the almshouse. He had a private room, with running water, and kept an automobile in the almshouse stables. A checkup on his movements revealed that twice at least each week he kept an engagement with his "best girl," who lived in the heart of Harrisburg. The trips were made in the machine, which he was allowed to keep handy.

The cases cited are said to be only the most flagrant. A number of other prisoners kept automobiles handy or had relatives supply transportation when they wished to leave the institution.

County commissioners are looking into the matter.

MARRY IN OWN CLASS, ADVICE FOR HAPPINESS

"Don't Fear Poverty," Says Preacher, Telling How to Select Mate.

WASHINGTON, N. Y. (INS.)—"Marry in your own class if you would insure married happiness."

That is the advice offered today by the Rev. Dr. George F. Shepherd, pastor of the Ashbury Methodist Episcopal church of this city and one of the best known divines of that denomination in New York state.

America can eradicate the divorce evil by observing three things, the clergyman declares.

"My first suggestion is, do not fear poverty," he says. "Too many of our young people think it is necessary for them to start in where their parents left off. It is not necessary when you start in on your married life to have four or five well-furnished rooms, with Turkish rugs on the floor. It would be better for a good many of them to start in with a rag on the floor, an old coal stove and a few stools, and build up their own home through hard work."

Wed Own "Knot." "My second suggestion is, marry your own kind. Do not marry outside your own class, creed or color. I know there are examples of where

it has worked out all right, but if you will follow the majority of such cases through to the end you will find that in the long run it is better to marry your own kind.

"Marry on about the same level where you are. Girls, do not think that the boys that you will find in some other church, or in some other city, are any better than those with whom you are now associated. Boys do not think that the girls to be found elsewhere are any sweeter, or any purer than those to be found in your own class.

Single Standard. "Third, give what you expect. If you expect of your wife purity do not bring to her a heart that has been stained. A woman demands above all else undivided love. They often say the way to a man's heart is thru his stomach. 'Feed the heart' is a common expression.

"But you cannot cure the ache in a woman's heart by that method. You cannot bring home a box of candy at the close of the day, or keep flowers on the stand and let that suffice. You cannot make your wife happy by buying trinkets. She wants them, but what she wants above all is undivided affection."

MARRIAGES ARE SCARCE, DESPITE PRETTY GIRLS
