RHINELAND IS AT MERCY OF ALLIED HANDS

(Continued from Page One)
at the mercy of the occupying powers.

The official statement lays stress on the catastrophic social conditions resulting from increasing unemployment in the Rhineland, and the general chaos which has followed the abandonment of passive resistance and the subsequent inability to arrive at a working understanding with the occupying powers with respect to resumption of industrial activities, and the reinstatement of the German official civil service employees.

Autonomous State Proposed.

The German government declines to discuss the question of an autonomous state. It declares that this is an issue which is wholly determined through the application of paragraph 18 of the federal constitution, and that the question of such a state has no present bearing on the situation in the Ruhr and the Rhineland. The statement issued Tuesday night says: "With regard to many reports abroad that an autonomous Rhineland was to be proclaimed with the consent of the imperial government, it is stated in authoritative circles that the imperial government maintains its attitude that no discussion is possible with regard to alterations in the legal relations of the Rhineland and the Ruhr to the Reich."

"The imperial government will never take any step in this direction and will never sanction the proclamation of a Rhineland republic. The only authority for any alterations in the relations of the Rhineland to the Reich is the constitution of the Reich."

Germany Helpless.

Since the founding of the negotiations between the French authorities and the industrialists, the Berlin officials have realized the hopelessness of liquidating the situation in the occupied zones of Germany's own resources, and Tuesday's action, which in its final analysis is considered as amounting to relinquishment of German administrative jurisdiction and the withdrawal of financial and other support from the Rhineland and the Ruhr areas, is seen in official quarters Tuesday night, was the only remedy left Germany's disposal, unless her courts disaster for the rest of the country by attempting to salvage the Rhineland and the Ruhr in the face of Franco-Belgian economic opposition and political resistance.

FREIGHT RATE CUT IS FUTILE, SAYS RAIL MEN

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Duluth, Georgian Bay with Buffalo, Montreal with Philadelphia and Baltimore, Halifax and St. Johns with New York and Boston.

"If export rates were reduced by as much as 25 per cent, it would be the equivalent of a 10 per cent reduction in the cost of the grain, and would still be competing with a Canadian surplus four times as great as his own, produced at a lower cost and getting a market on equally favorable terms. And since the Canadian grain can pay 20 cents a bushel duty and invade our own domestic market it goes without saying that he can meet any competition we can offer in the foreign market."

"Therefore the only effect of lowering our export rates on wheat would be some lowering of prices to the foreign customer. The most searching analysis fails to disclose how the American wheat grower would profit a penny. The saving to the foreign customer, however, would come out of the still insufficient revenues of the American and Canadian railroads."

Vicent Grower's Chance.

"The American wheat grower has been given every reasonable opportunity to reach the world's wheat market. On September 1, 1920, the Eastern freight lines reduced export on ex-lake grain 10 per cent. On August 2, 1921, those rates were reduced another 25 per cent, and this reduction was general. On January 1, 1922, domestic rates were reduced 10 per cent. All of these reductions were voluntary."

"The export wheat rates of the Eastern trunk lines today are lower than they were during the period of federal control. When there was an active foreign demand, wheat moved freely for export under them."

"If the cost of reaching the seaboard were what stood in the way of the American wheat grower his problem would be already solved. For from Buffalo the large canal will deliver wheat alongside ship in New York Harbor for five and one-half cents a bushel—a rate lower than anyone has suggested the railroads could be expected to make. Yet, instead of moving on this low rate, three-quarters of all the grain moving from Buffalo for export moves by rail."

"While of course, any group of men are entirely within their rights in asking for a review of a rate matter, would it not help if the above facts were made generally known to the American farmer?"

Having no further interests in a mortgaged parliament, that is the two cities, on amendments to this bill the government fell to 20 and 11, respectively, to the delight of the Laborites, who raised derisive cheers.

There may be another exciting debate Thursday when J. Ramsay MacDonald, leader of the opposition, moves a vote of censure of the government for its failure to solve the unemployment problem, but the real interest here is transferred from the parliament to the constituencies. None of the various parties is too well prepared for elections which have been seriously anticipated, and the whole issue of the members will be absorbed in an intensive election campaign.

Bond Sale Is Ordered.

VERNONIA, Or.—At a special meeting of the city council Friday the sale of the remaining \$5000 of the \$40,000 bond issue for the municipal water system was authorized. The system is complete except some extensions made necessary by the building activities near the city limits and the necessity of the purchasing of a large capacity pump and filter system, which has been recommended by the state board of health. The city is supplied by a small pump, which is temporarily installed to provide fire protection and a domestic water supply until the larger one arrives from New Jersey.

When finished Vernonia will have one of the most complete water systems in the country, and one which will maintain a minimum pressure of 35 pounds in the business district.

\$20,000 Church Planned

RAINIER, Or.—At a meeting of friends and members of the First Congregational church of Rainier it was voted to build a new church on the site of the present structure on Fourth and C streets as soon as all arrangements can be made. The new building is to cost approximately \$20,000.

Whether the present church will be sold or razed has not been decided, but the ground on which it stands will be cut down to the level of the street when construction starts. It is now known when the work of building will begin, although a committee is investigating plans for the move.

Much of the grain which was considered to be almost a total loss some time ago, is being threshed out in fine shape. While the greater part will be too soft for milling it will make excellent feed. Due to the continued rain much of the second cutting of alfalfa was lost, either thru being spoiled while in the shock, or by the cutting being delayed until frosts had rendered the crop unfit for feed.

SALEM, Or.—For the first time in more than a year there is a labor surplus in Salem, according to officials of the federal employment office here.

A total of 116 men applied for jobs November 10, while only 45 applicants found employment. Among the applicants for jobs were five nurses.

ASTORIA, Or.—The body of Billie Herman Kangas, the 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Kangas, 73 West Commercial street, who was drowned in the Columbia river off the Schmidt cold storage plant on October 24, was found in the Skopus river today. 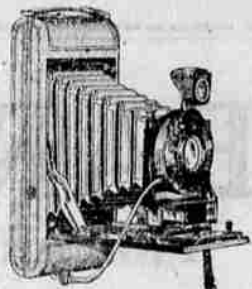
