FILMS NOW SPARE VIVISECTION PAIN

ROME, (INS)—Monsieur Henri Langer, head of the physiological experiments at the Sorbonne, has suggested that to prevent needless suffering many of the research cases in which vivisection seems necessary could be reproduced satisfactorily by the camera, for the benefit of other students. Since the year 1914 two Italian scientists—Professor Pietro Giacomini and Professor Alberico Benedicenti—have applied this idea in their laboratories at Genoa. The films were prepared with great care and are regularly and satisfactorily used by the student students. Some of these show, for example, the action of chloroform on the pulse and on the blood pressure, and the influence of medicine on certain nerves.

A series of films also had been prepared and used extensively by these two scientists to illustrate popular lectures on the action of cocaine on the human organism. All of these films have been reproduced at their request, for the pharmacological laboratories of Lisbon and Brussels as well as those in Italy.

Londoners Admire Their Police.

LONDON, (AP)—The interest and courtesy shown by the London police in the welfare of the public constantly brings its reward. This is usually expressed in requests to policemen's funds, hospitals and bairns by people of varying circumstances who, at one time or another, have been aided by policemen.

Consumption of Horse Meat As Food Increasing in France.

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Consumption of horse meat as an article of daily diet is increasing in France, the Department of Commerce is informed, and the annual slaughter of horses is estimated at about 120,000 head. Of this number about 100,000 are of French origin, while the greater portion of the balance is imported from Great Britain.

The advantages claimed for horse meat are its comparative cheapness and nutritive qualities. Its sale is regulated by law to avoid its substitution for other meats and it is usually sold in butcher shops, especially adapted for that purpose.

Restoration of Royal Palace Uncover Valuable Paintings

WARSAW, (AP)—During the restoration of the Warsaw royal palace, dating from 1802, beautiful mural paintings of the 18th century have been discovered hidden beneath papers and tapestries put on the walls during the Russian occupation of Warsaw. The paintings are of the Italian school and of great artistic value. Every endeavor is being made to restore them completely. No clue yet has been found as to the identity of the painter.
