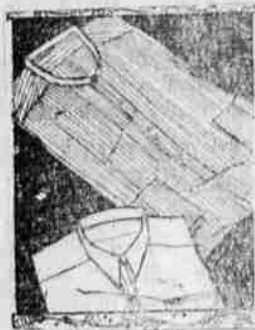

PENDLETON IS GIVEN BIG SUM

Round-Up Directors Present City with Gift of \$10,617 for Building and Upkeep of City Parks;

PENDLETON, (Special)—That the Round-Up annually pays dividends was illustrated here Wednesday at which time a gift of \$10,617.29 was made to the city of Pendleton by the board of directors of the annual wild-west show staged here.

The sum will be used for improvement and beautification of the present park, and to establish a new park between Court and Wade and Clay and Market streets, according to an announcement made by the board as to the conditions of the gift.

At the meeting last night the dates for the 1924 show were set as September 15, 18 and 20 and the present board of directors was named to serve again in 1924, with H. W. Collins, incumbent, as president.

The gift is the first made by the big show since 1918, when \$5000 was given to the American Red Cross. In 1922 the show closed up a substantial profit, but the money was needed at that time to further the interests of the Round-Up. Part of the money will be used for the improvement of Round-Up Park itself and plans to that effect have already been drawn up by Howard Wood, landscape architect.
