GERMANY IS CONFRONTED BY PROBLEMS

Suggests that if Chancellor Stresemann attempts to force a vote of confidence when the reichstag convenes, he will meet with withering defeat, as the only tangible support vouchsafed him in the present situation accrues from the Clericals and Democrats and the wholly disunited People's party.

May Dissolve Reichstag—Under these conditions there seems to be a strong probability that the chancellor will refuse to go before the reichstag with his "rump" government, and will anticipate defeat by resigning or forcing a dissolution of the reichstag and continuing in office at the head of a non-parliamentary government, compelling a semi-dictatorial dictatorship.

The situation with regard to the government's decisions concerning the Ruhr and the Rhineland remained wholly obscure Thursday night, although inspired official bulletins and utterances continue to make emphatic declaration of the government's intention to withdraw money subsidies and unemployment doles, permitting the situation in the occupied zones to lapse into an informal industrial and economic autonomy.

Reduction of People's Taxes Demand of Borah

\$500,000,000 would mean much more than the actual amount indicates. It would be of almost incalculable psychological value, giving assurance to the country that congress was at last considering the interest of those who pay the bills.

"When city, county, state and Federal taxes are included, the taxpayers of this country carry a burden which I doubt can be equalled anywhere else. The evil effect of this, economically and morally, cannot well be overestimated. We have undoubtedly, without exaggeration, reached a point where taxes are not only discouraging to enterprise but actually destructive in many instances and in many ways."

Upon what possible theory can we ask the taxpayers of this country to take \$500,000,000 of the load you are carrying but we will not do so? It is true that most of the flagrant and fearful increases in taxes are in the states, but extravagance in public expenditures is both contagious and infectious. Our continued waste and profligacy at the capital will discourage economy throughout the states.

Fears Spending Orgy.

"But while our duty is perfectly plain and while serious conditions throughout the country plead for reduction is not the program. Instead of this being a congress of economy it gives the greatest assurance that not only millions, but literally billions, will be added to the obligations of the government and to the load of the taxpayer."

"We are just now in Washington witnessing the uncovering of a shameful saturnalia of incompetency, waste and graft. Money appropriated for the benefit of the wounded and disabled of the late war has been thrown here and there as if dollars were paper. I doubt very much when everything is considered, the sacredness of the fund and the pathetic needs of the disabled, if a more grovelling exhibition of unconscious indifference, or dishonesty has ever been disclosed. The peculiar feature of it is that those responsible for this condition seem to think that it is public money, only the taxpayers' money, that no great culpability is attached to its criminal waste. I beg to say that spirit, that view of the use of public money is marvellously widespread."

Taxpayer May Turn.

"There is a strong indication, however, that the taxpayer himself is about to turn upon his torturer. He is apparently beginning to give evidence of the fact that he is alive and has a deep interest not unaccompanied with the bitterness in what is going on. It is fortunate if it is so. It may prove a hazardous enterprise for a congress to face a constituency next year upon which it has piled vast sums in addition to what that constituency is already wrestling with."

"The method of reduction is important, exceedingly important. The particular taxes which are to be lowered will call for careful consideration. But all this, I maintain, is secondary in importance, in point of time at least, to the question of whether we are going to act upon the matter at all or simply postpone it. If we get the subject before us we can work out the details and there is not much danger but what the taxes which bear most heavily upon those least able to pay will be lowered."

"The tax question in this country is no longer merely an economic problem. It is also distinctly and unmistakably a moral problem. Which families all over this country tell all the year through and at last are able to save their homes, even if so fortunate, but must deny their families and their children the ordinary comforts or the educational facilities justly due them, such a life is nothing less than economic prostitution. A campaign against these fearful burdens ought to begin here at Washington this winter, ought to be carried into every state and into the coming campaign to see if it is possible to bring the spell of spending which is now enervating and corrupting government and discouraging and demoralizing the people."

DEAD WOMAN IS NOW IDENTIFIED

tion depends include curved joints on the little fingers and the little toes, a mark on the teeth, and an old scar on the shin bone of the right leg.

Body Is Examined.

Mr. and Mrs. Rogers, parents of Mrs. Pittman, conceived the idea that the woman found in the river might be their daughter after they read newspaper accounts of the finding of the body. They arrived here yesterday in their car from Eagle Valley, not far from Baker and found the coroner and asked for the information he had on the case. As a result of their inquiries a trip was taken by the coroner and Mr. and Mrs. Rogers to the scene where the body was found.

Mr. Rogers explained that the little fingers of both his daughter's hands curved inward decidedly toward the third fingers, and that the same defect existed in the bones of her little toes. A nick showed in one of her front teeth, he said, and she was injured as a child when an axe wound was inflicted on her right shin bone. With these facts to work on Coroner Brown examined the body.

Identification Marks Found.

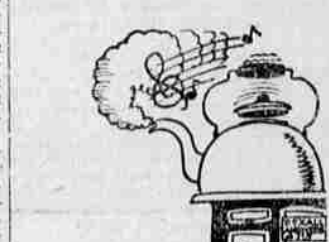
The body, when taken out of the river, was minus both hands, and one foot was missing, but yesterday Mr. Rogers was able to gather remaining pieces of the skeleton from the water's edge of the Columbia, and the joints showed the curvature which he had previously described to the coroner. The right shin bone showed a scar which corresponded to the old wound that was inflicted on his daughter when she was a little girl.

An examination of the teeth showed that one in front had a small nick in it such as he had described. Some of the teeth on the left side, both upper and lower, were missing but the jaw was broken, and some of the teeth were found in the throat when a closer examination was made after the body had been taken from its temporary grave. The coroner is of the opinion that the teeth were knocked out with a blunt instrument at the same time her skull was fractured.

Husband Is Suspected.

The fact that marks on the dead woman correspond in such agreement with physical characteristics of their daughter caused Mr. and Mrs. Rogers yesterday to come to the definite conclusion that the body is that of their daughter.
