Wilcox, timber examiner in the office of the State national forest, with a view to its purchase by the government. Wilcox has just returned to his duties in the local office of the forest after having spent two and a half months in field work. Mr. Wilcox spent most of his time in the Five Rivers country.

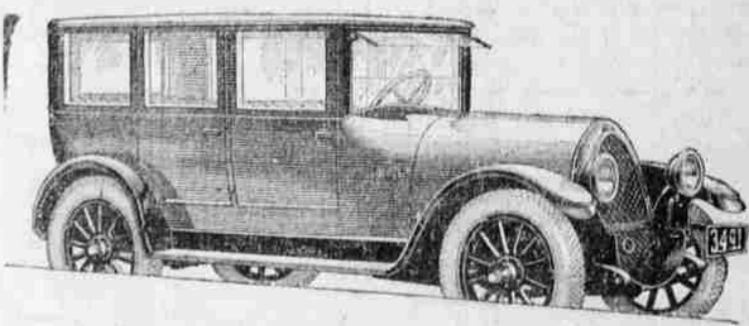
