The Greenwood Parent-Teachers' association observed Educational Week Friday, November 16, by a very interesting and instructive program. The meeting was opened by a short business meeting, after which a musical program was enjoyed by all. An orchestra composed mostly of Greenwood people, directed by Mr. Tuttle, a prominent violinist of the city, played two pleasing numbers: "The Death of Hector," from the "Iddo," directed by Miss Maude Cramer, was arranged by two Junior high school boys, Ray Kimura and Leo Platts; a piano duet was rendered by Miss Kennedy and Mr. Hoffman, of Portland; and the girls' Triple Trio, of the Junior high school, directed by Mrs. Patricia Green sang "The Song of the Wood Nymph" and very cleverly gave an encore, entitled, "The Alphabet." The members of the Triple Trio are Deulah Shanks, Ann Coopers, Alice Struck, Ellen Boehman, Louise Vaughn, Martina Simpson, Gertrude Egan, Ruby Gardner, and Leivann Graham.

The main speaker of the evening was E. D. Towler, principal of the La Grande high school, who discussed the subject of Education. He developed the thought that education gives vision, that the American public and our own old ideas in education and in developing new ideals. He stated that the 25 million school children of our country are the nation's greatest asset, that the education of today is a preparation for the citizen of tomorrow and should not be measured only in dollars and cents. He gave some astounding figures to prove that the amount of money spent for education was small in comparison with that spent for luxuries in this country.

A. C. Hampton, superintendent of La Grande schools, was called upon to respond to Mr. Towler's speech and he stated that the schools of La Grande are making progress. He spoke of the results of the recent census content, conducted by the American Legion, in which members of the La Grande high school won first, second and third prizes. The second award going to a Greenwood boy, Jack Hiatt.

Gloves.
Paris, (U.S.S.)—The time has passed for fine ladies to go about barehanded. The glove, in the last few months, has taken a very important place in the feminine toilette and this season will see models that have never been worn before.

For the tailleur the gauntlet is still in order. In favor of suede, a little masculine in cut, it is the glove for the morning to accompany a costume severe in line. It is also the glove for the "elegante" who drives her own car. For winter weather these gloves will be lined with fur or fleece.

With the fashionable straight coats or the trimly tailored costume there are the gloves with little cuffs which sometimes encircle the wrist very securely. And it is these little cuffs that fancy reigns supreme. They rarely touch the body of the glove or are perforated and worked to resemble precious lace. Many are embroidered in the corresponding tone of the costume. The most in vogue are cuffs adorned with batons or silk embroidery in cameo effect. Woolen embroidery is often strikingly used in bright colors on black or beige skins.

Gloves fur-trimmed about the wrist band are very popular for this year of fur. Squirrel, skunk and ermine are much used. The Maison de Blanc makes a specialty of silk-lined gloves with charming cuffs embroidered in Beauvais work. Others are hand painted, light colors stitched with black are the rule. For evening wear steel beadwork is having great success, that is when gloves are worn, which is very rare in the evening. Nearly all chic women have completely discarded their evening gloves and leave open to inspection their lovely hands.

One Cloak an Exception.

SIGN POST BEARS WITNESS TO FAMOUS COURTSHIPS

RINGMERE, England, (AP)—This little old village gave to the world the wives of John Harvard and William Penn, and a sign-post to tell the passing motorists of this fact has been erected. It was dedicated recently by George Harvey, the American Ambassador.

John Harvard, founder of the University which bears his name, married the daughter of John Sadler, vicar of Ringmere. Penn married the daughter of Sir William Springett, whose name for a century preceding had been linked to this village, and whose blood has come down, in unbroken line, to the giver of the sign-post, Lady Hemelstrand.

New Fossil Is Found.
OREGON CITY, Or.—Part of a vertebra, no doubt that of a prehistoric monster, has been added to the collection of curios owned by A. O. Hollingsworth at Gladstone. This was found on the beach at Newport in September by Mr. Hollingsworth.

The portion of the vertebra found by Hollingsworth has been petrified, and is about six inches in length, and in circumference is about 1 1/2 inches. and pays more for a box of apples and one dollar freight and heating or icing charge additional than they get for a barrel of their own product that contains three times as many apples by weight as does our boxes. Why all this "QUALITY" "THE WORLD IS THE JUDGE."

Quality and Daintiness.
Our western apples not only have the quality but are more dainty and beautiful in looks for the reason that our climatic conditions are more favorable. During the summer months throughout the western states, they are subject to intense heat and dry winds. This atmosphere is rather at all times filled with dust and foreign matter that make it impossible to see clearly 4 or 5 miles while in the Northwest the winds from the Pacific ocean carry no foreign matter and its no trouble nearly any day in the year to see quite clearly the Mountains and farm lands 20 to 50 miles away due to the clear pure atmosphere.

In the eastern states frequent showers carry down the dirt and filth in the atmosphere and it is deposited on the apples and sticks to it and continues from time to time to gather this filth as the season progresses making an excellent place for Fungus Spores to lodge and commence their ravages of destruction. Thus it is that the eastern apple has a dirty rusty look as compared with the western apple, and this is one of the main reasons why the world judges the northwestern apple an supreme.

The expense of overcoming this condition if a pun could be studied out would make the growing cost prohibitive.

About Fungus Diseases
There is a great many very dangerous Fungus diseases in the east that have not found their way into the West also many insect pests that we do not have and to combat them to a finish it would take a battery of spray guns large enough to break a Hindenburg line of defense. The world would be prohibitive. We have in the past few years had several International apple shows that have been judged by the best Talent the Pomological Society could furnish from Washington D. C., and I would ask if you ever heard of an eastern state getting a prize over the west. In days gone by New York and Michigan used to fill the markets as far west as Denver. The rates now are the same from New York to Denver as from the Pacific Northwest to Denver. You do not see the eastern apple there any more. The western growers have pushed them back east of the Missouri River entirely and it is pretty safe to say that in 5 years they will not cross west of the Mississippi River. "The world is the Judge. What the people want they will insist on having and keep insisting until they get it. We are now making breads on their European trade notwithstanding the cost of our product is nearly double to the consumer over there. "The world does the Judging."
