OLD GERMAN SOCIALIST DIES.

BERLIN, (AP)—Wilhelm Pfannhuch, who died recently in Berlin, was the oldest member of the Social-Democratic party and personally knew Karl Marx, Lassalle and Engels. He was 82 years old. Pfannhuch was the honorary president of the Weimar general assembly of 1919, which gave the German republic its present constitution. He was first elected to the Reichstag in 1884 and was re-elected subsequently.

U. S. Soil Leads in Oil. WASHINGTON, (AP)—The United States produced almost two-thirds of the world output of petroleum last year, and Mexico slightly more than last year. The Geological Survey reports that world production was 57,300,000 barrels, of which the United States supplied 57,300,000 and Mexico 182,278,000 barrels.

In the 45 years, 1857-1922, world production of petroleum totaled 10,366,778,000 barrels. The United States furnished 42.5 percent, or 4,359,542,000 barrels.

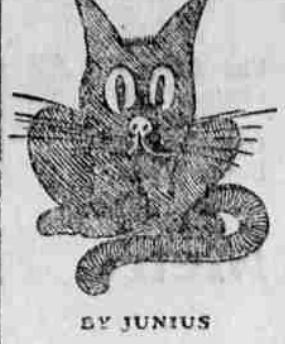

SUGGESTIONS MADE TO AID IN MAILING CHRISTMAS GIFTS

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Cooperation in mailing Christmas gifts is being sought by the postoffice department. Here are the suggestions of Third Assistant Postmaster General Glover:

Mail early. Proper postage fully on all matter. Address all matter plainly and completely, giving street address whenever possible.

Place sender's name and address in upper left corner of address side. Pack articles carefully in strong, durable containers.

Wrap parcels securely but do not seal them except when sending a printed label or label containing a "Postpaid" Merchandise. This parcel may be opened for postal inspection if necessary. Sealed parcels not so labeled or indorsed are subject to postage at the latter rate.

Parcels may be marked "Do not open until Christmas."

Insure valuable parcels. Do not include return with parcels, as doing so would subject entire parcels to letter postage.

Written greetings such as "Merry Christmas," "Happy New Year," "With Best Wishes," and names, numbers, or symbols for the purpose of description may be included with fourth class (parcel post) mail. Books may bear simple postoffice inscriptions not of a personal nature. Other written additions subject parcels to letter postage. Communications received at the first class rate may be sent with parcels prepaid at the fourth-class rate by securely attaching the envelopes containing the letters or other written matter to outside of parcels.

Reports Royal Palace Never Saw a Bathtub

PRAGUE, (AP)—Prague counts as many curiosity shops as the ordinary city does butchers and bakers, and articles of striking interest often are to be seen in their windows. Not long ago one displayed an elaborate bathtub, powder ornamented with copper, said to have belonged to and been used by the late Emperor of Austria, Francis Joseph, and the exhibit attracted as much attention as would have the actual throne of the royal household.

The piece of imperial furniture was bought by a man who made a fortune during the war by selling paper-issued shares to the Austrian army, and it became the most valued piece of his collection in his new villa near Prague. He showed it to his visitors with much pride, and related patronizingly how much it had cost him.

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LUMBER TRADE FAIRLY BRISK

Lumber trade continues fairly brisk as a result of the large amount of hand-to-mouth buying being done by both retail dealers and factory customers, says the American Lumberman, Chicago. The inventory period is drawing near and business men generally are striving to make the most possible use of their stock, and are therefore restricting their purchases. Their needs being constant the amount of their forced buying is of no mean volume. Lumbermen believe that all buyers will enter the new year with very low stocks and will have to buy heavily immediately after the inventory and holidays. Meanwhile there is not a great deal of other hardwoods or softwoods at the mills. Fundamental conditions therefore are sound, and even if the present dullness finds reflection in slightly reduced prices, any general

weakening of the lumber market is not expected.

The prospects for country trade next spring are reassuring. Much business is also expected from the railroads, which are understood to be contemplating the construction of a large quantity of rolling stock during the coming year. Some such business is already being planned to develop, and the car material market has strengthened. The city building outlook is excellent, not only for next spring but for this winter. The open weather enjoyed so far this fall has stimulated construction activities markedly, and building material dealers look forward to some weeks of excellent trade.

Pacific business is of similar volume, especially in Douglas fir. A good quarter of all business handled by the coast mills is for foreign accounts. Southern pine exporters report steady demand from the West Indies and South America, a fair trade with Europe, and sawmills of domestic lumberers state that their product is moving to the United Kingdom and continental markets in larger volume than at any other time in recent years.

THIS MILLION, OR—Practically one billion feet of virgin timber, largely pine but with a sprinkling of fir, in the Oregon National forest, some of which in the southern part of Wasco county, will be placed on the market by the government for any buyer in amount as a business enterprise has been made. It was announced today by Forest-Service director, who returned from a conference with forestry officials in Portland. It is expected that the sale will be completed and bids called for by next July. A preliminary examination has been completed and in their report the government's forestry engineers have noted out that the timber will be the finest in the nation, with the exception and utilization of the Great Southern railway, which now has its southern terminus at Portland.
