University Five Started

University of Oregon, Eugene—William Reinhart, who, since the opening of the University of Oregon this fall, has held the position of head coach for the freshman football squad, has been appointed basketball coach for the varsity hoop team.

Reinhart was selected from the field of applicants by the executive council for the Associated Students, after being recommended by Virgil Rice, director of athletics at the University. Rice's recommendation was the outcome of an expressed desire on the part of the basketball letter-men that Reinhart should be mentor of the varsity hoop sport.

The record established by Reinhart as an Oregon athlete seems to give him a clear call to the position, as well as the fact that he was a student of the basketball system advocated by Bohler, basketball coach of last year. This will be greatly in Reinhart's favor as he has a team that is well schooled in the Bohler methods, which placed a premium on fast passing and team play.

As it stands now, Coach Reinhart will be able to start his work with a group of men that are well versed in the system with which he is familiar, whereas, if a coach of another type were appointed he would have to undo the system of basketball known to Reinhart and his players.

Oregon's prospects for basketball look exceedingly bright this year. Very few of last year's players were lost through graduation and Coach Reinhart will start practice next Monday with seven lettermen of previous years in the squad. Letter-men who will turn out for practice Monday are Latham, center; Alstok, forward; Gowans, forward; Roekker, forward; Shuford, guard; Chapman, guard; Edmonds, forward; Beadle, guard.

These men the new coach will have some exceptionally good material from last year's freshman team to draw upon.

TIGERS TO GO TO WALLOWA ON SATURDAY

And he has cause to keep his opinion fixed there also. Wallowa is preparing to defeat La Grande and if the Tigers want off such a load, it will be a feat worthy of real mention. Wallowa always was hard to beat on her own grounds, as more than one La Grande high school eleven that played in the past can testify to. Several Blue and White teams have went hopefully to the Wallowa country and came away defeated, the bitterst of defeat hanging with them. And Wallowa's team this year is said to be stronger at the present than any thrust out in that section for many a year.

Wallowa started off fairly easy. First she took the coast from the alumni 12 to 6. A couple of weeks later she made her road to triumph 24 to 9 and then she defeated Union 12 to 7 at Union. Union played her best game of the year against Wallowa but Wallowa, with straight football riding on a sweeping end run, was not to be losers. Then another rest and Enterprise, thirty and best-footed winners over Baker 27 to 7, was downed by Wallowa by the imposing score of 38 to 12. And that happened at Enterprise, incidentally.

It is no prevarication to say that Wallowa, on dope and pre-game observation has a 50-50 chance to beat the Tigers. Speaking straight from the shoulder the La Grande team is still far from what it should be. Kicking with cockiness, due to their 33 to 7 defeat of the Baker lads, the best eleven—one and all—seem imbued with the idea that Wallowa is going to be easy work for the Blue and White—like playing Imbler's second team, for instance.

Outside of that over-confidence that tinges into bragaducts, several faults are still present.

Metcalf Showing Up. Starting out with the most important piece on the team, the quarterback, Captain Metcalf isn't playing the brand of ball he should. His grasp, supposed to be his main asset, is weak. At Baker last week he tried a place-kick with the score La Grande 12, Baker 7, when a touch-down could have been made easily— if he had used his head. Then Metcalf is slow in coming signals and his downing seems to get into the entire team and slow them up, collectively and individually. Glass is showing up well and unless Metcalf shows improvement, may get a chance in the Wallowa game. He slips his signals out in good shape and occasionally raises his hand and surveys the other team before calling 'em.

Garity Better. Garity, fullback, is improving. There's no question about that. In the Baker game he shows a 50 percent improvement over past performances. But yet he still hits the line every so often straight up—and a fullback isn't supposed to bang the opposition that way.

Shorwood's Kicking is rotten but otherwise, he is playing a classy game. His open field running and his off tackle smashes are showing more driving force. But the punting, and La Grande is going to need a punter at Wallowa, is weak. Occasionally Shorwood punts one over 40 yards but to every good punt probably contributes two or three 10 yard boots.

Kerr has one main fault that still sticks with him. On end runs, instead of cutting in and following his letter-men in some fashion, he still persists in trying to outrun the opposition and is jorred back for that reason. He is quite often showing for losses outside of that he is showing up well.

At the wings, Price and Williams are going so-so. Both are falling down on the receiving end of passes and both seem slower than they should be. The first mentioned fault he has all their's however, as the backfield

men aren't placing their passes as they should. Instead of leading the ends by about a foot or two, they are shooting them a foot or two short, and the ends have to stop up and snuff out a stop to catch 'em. Which doesn't mean any extra yardage.

Coker and McClure are both playing good ball.

At guards, Stamer is going at a fast pace than earlier in the season but Hughes still plays too high. Light as he is, he must correct that fault if he wishes to hold his Wallowa opposition.

Hammett's passing is accurate but as a loose center on the defensive, he isn't backing up the line as intelligently as he should yet.

Lynch, who has been unable to practice part of the season, is showing up well at end and may displace either Price or Williams in the Wallowa game. One thing Lynch has that the team in general lacks until he gets into the lineup, is plenty of spirit and pep and full-it-up-tiveness. Lynch, like Glass, generally pops the team up when he goes into the line-up.

Coach MacTavish is planning on taking 17 men to Wallowa.
