though voting dry, he recalled the fact that these congressmen and U. S. senators absolutely derided the appointments, in their states, of U. S. district attorneys, U. S. marshals and Federal prohibition officers. Notwithstanding these conditions, he maintained, with an elaborate argument supported by statistics which he claimed supported the argument, that conditions were infinitely better than ever before. "If it be true, as claimed by the wets, that more liquor is sold than ever before, why is it that the liquor interests, backed very strongly by the moneyed interests who largely dominate our finances, are engaged in a campaign to restore the sale of light wines and beers? Why, the mere understanding of what the wets are doing answers the question."

The recent statement of President Coolidge to the assembled governors of several states at Washington was quoted, and commented upon favorably by Mr. Crim. He commended Secretary Mellon for being as vigorous in the administration of the national prohibition act as he had been. "It is considered that the Mellon banking interests, along with the other big banking interests, over night had lost the value of whisky as collateral to the loans made to distillers and brewers, amounting to billions of dollars."
