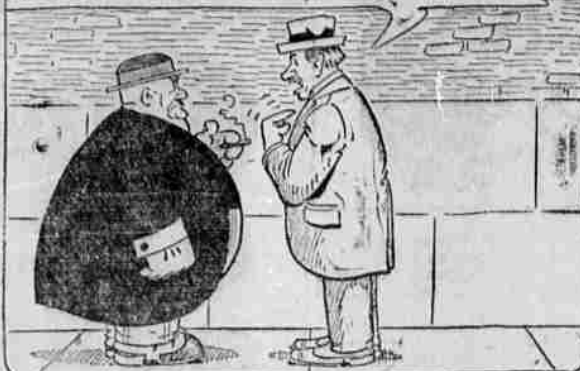

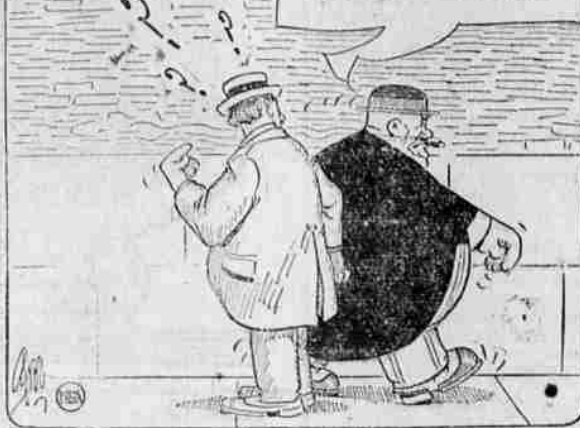

Harbin Gay and Vain Rather Than City of Wild Women, Sin

HARBIN. (AP)—This city, reputed to be the last outpost of sin, open and unabashed, has been found to be less wicked than supposed.

These morally atrocious but sometimes alluring forms of amusement that have given to the world the phrase "demi-monde," and long since found to have abandoned their traditional haunts in Paris, Vienna, Havana and Buenos Aires, were supposed to have found refuge in Harbin.

Even Shanghai, known as a man's town and a port which rumor has portrayed as a city of lotus and poppy where people do as they please, had been given second place to Harbin in the matter of immoral doings. The truth is, neither Shanghai nor Harbin resemble Babylon to any great degree. In Shanghai the public is all worked up over the question: Can a cabaret girl be good? In Harbin the problem is to get cabaret girls.

Harbin is a young and foreign town. It is Russian rather than Chinese. It is a mixture of village and metropolis, of crudeness and elegance, and of guile and safety and of those sturdier pursuits common to the Volvilles and Main Streets of every country. There is no drainage and in wet weather horses lounge through the water dragging drunks up to the axles. The principal occupation of the shopkeepers here seems to be sitting down.

There are many women and girls from the grannies of Moscow and Petrograd and from nearer cities who are here to amuse and be amused, but above all to get in this wild, new place a livelihood or perhaps a small fortune which "some day" they hope to take back to relatives. But there are plenty of good women, too. The fresh, ruddy faces of women lately peasants or the daughters of peasants abound. And like the women of all new towns who have menfolk and children to care for they work hard.

Even in this mud and in these sordid places where men and women meet to drink and dance and slug as a means of occupying reality there is plenty of virtue. As much in proportion to the feminine population, perhaps, as was to be found at the old French courts, opportunities considered. No girl is too young to manage to obtain a lipstick. And many lips here are far too crimson to be the work of wind and sun.

And so the people not bent on business alone play and smile and wait, keeping what peace they can with the Chinese authorities and hoping the "Reds" will not come to make things worse.

BATTLING SIKI TO MEET KID NORFOLK TONIGHT IN N. Y.

NEW YORK. (AP)—Batling Siki, the Senegalese who wrestled the title of world's light-heavyweight champion from George Carpentier, makes his American ring debut Tuesday night at Madison Square garden in a 15-round match with Kid Norfolk. Both expect to make 175 pounds by Tuesday afternoon and the victor will lay claim to the negro light-heavyweight championship. Siki has undergone strenuous training for the match.

Siki's appearance has caused considerable interest but critics believe that in Norfolk, a hard-hitting negro, the Senegalese will be put to a severe test. It will be the battler's first important bout since he lost the light-heavyweight title on points to Mike McTigue at Dublin last St. Patrick's day.

The semi-final match, a 12-rounder will bring together two promising welterweights, Eddie Burnbrook, army crick, and Harry Galtini of Brooklyn.

PROFESSIONAL MEN HIT

LEIPZIG. (AP)—This is a town of by-professors in Germany. Doctors, lawyers, teachers, professors, scientists, dentists, preachers, government employes and actors who still cling to their old callings are, for the most part, doing something else in their free time to piece out their incomes.

Stock brokerage and money-changing are popular sidelines for professional folk. All sorts of securities are in great demand among persons who want to get rid of their marks as soon as possible, with the result that there is flourishing business for bond and securities agents, who conduct their business in a more or less secret way.

Everybody is dodging taxes, consequently there is a great desire among persons with funds to conceal their wealth.

Many professional men have also become agents for coal dealers. There are many restrictions on the sale of fuel. Consequently it is bootlegged, much as foreign money is.

Manual labor is much better paid than many professions, with the result that men of excellent education are accepting positions as janitors and street cleaners. One Berlin lawyer who had a lucrative practice before the war is now running a dustcart, and is much happier than many of his associates in the practice of the law who are waiting in ill-health for clients to visit them in unheated offices.
