Union County Statistics Of Motor Vehicles Given; 1924 Licenses to Be Red

shows that in Union County there were licensed 14 motor vehicle dealers, 127 chauffeurs, 5,272 motor vehicle operators, 67 motorcycles, 2,892 passenger cars, 2 ambulances and hearses, 10 busses and stages, 95 commercial cars of less than one ton capacity, 184 trucks of from one to five tons capacity, and 19 trailers of from one to five tons capacity, or a total of 3,193 licensed passenger and commercial vehicles. During 1922 there was a total of 2,687 passenger and commercial vehicles licensed in your county.

Between September 15, 1922 and September 15, 1923, of the receipts from motor vehicle licenses and fees \$257,422.39 was distributed to the counties of the state, and there was turned over or transferred to the State Highway fund \$2,992,476.56 during that period. Union County's share of the foregoing allotment to the counties was \$17,186.47.

Alleged Immoral Conditions In La Grande's Colored Town Aired by Citizens

fore, asserted that the complaints of the citizens were just but that they should bring their evidence before the city court when trials were in progress and make convictions more easily arrived at.

Mr. Elmore announced that it was difficult for residents of the district to get specific evidence but that general evidence could be given.

L. W. Weeks cited several cases of tawdry going to Doe Rogers' place under peculiar and suspicious circumstances.

Mr. Ruth Ignearson filed several doubtful suspicious going-on, mentioning that tawdry made visits to a certain residence on 8 avenue that did not appear to be moral visits or visits that were law-abiding.

To Give Matter Attention

Commissioner Williams then announced that the city commission and city authorities would give the matter thorough attention.

Shortly afterwards R. C. Fields recommended that Doe Rogers be placed under arrest immediately. Chief Hayes promptly said that was agreed to him and that he would locate him and place him behind bars in a short time. Mr. Fields also mentioned that it was during the city janitor work for Mr. Kinde at the time that City Manager Hays asked that he turn his keys over to Fire Chief C. O. Marchison so that Doe Rogers could do the janitor work. City Manager Hays stated that the reason for putting Rogers on so long was to save the city \$20 per month and that the commission had authorized such action.

Fines Not All Paid

A discussion that followed that discussed the facts that Paul Fagin and Martha Mossell had both not completely paid all of fines imposed upon them after conviction. Chief Hayes said that it was impossible to jail them inasmuch as the city had no funds to pay for their confinement by the county, now harbored Stella French, Indian, and could hold no more and also that he had absolutely nothing to do with the payment of fines by Paul Fagin on the installment plan.
