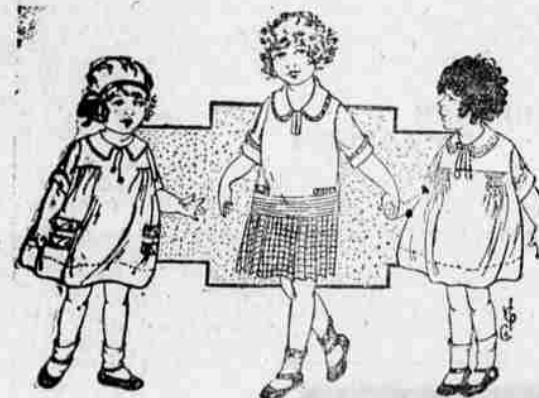

WALLOWA HAS GRANGE MEET

Fund for Building Grange Hall Discussed; Lostine-Leap Market Road Work Progressing.

WALLOWA. (Special)—The Wallowa Grange met Saturday, at which time several matters were taken up and discussed. The question of raising a fund to be used in building a Grange hall was brought up. After being discussed it was decided to appoint a committee, to list articles which anyone care to donate for such a purpose, and hold an auction sale December 1, 1923, the proceeds to be applied on such a fund. A start has already been made on the fund. M. E. Wently gave a dance during the

summer, and has turned in \$39.45 to apply on the fund. It is felt that by taking the matter up at this time, that it will be possible within a year or so to erect a hall, without any great cost to any one member.

The work on the Lostine-Leap market road is progressing very rapidly, the grading being almost completed, with the exception of the last couple of miles of the road, near its termination into Leap, on which the grading crew is now working. The bridges and stock passes on Parsnip creek being constructed by Lathrop brothers are nearing completion while the work on the river bridge near the Williams place is going along in nice shape. The three costs of surfacing has nearly all been put on between the Williams farm and the town of Evans. The trucks are hauling to the Parsnip creek end of the road now. The material being used is coarse gravel and gravel for the base, with a clay covering as the second coating, followed with fine screened river gravel, which promises to make a splendid combination, the screened gravel appears to adhere well to the clay coating and packs down in fine shape where travel has been going over the road. This road when completed will no doubt be one of the best roads to be found anywhere in the county. The grade for the entire distance is a very easy one, following up the Parsnip creek canyon it enters the Leap section of the country, on the most uniform grade to be found anywhere in the vicinity. C. A. Hunter finished threshing his crop of fall wheat Saturday counting from seven and eight thousand bushels.

S. P. Company to Expend Millions For Equipment

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Southern Pacific company Wednesday put before the interstate commerce commission for approval its project for the purchase of \$27,200,000 worth of new equipment. The company intends to lease in connection with financing the equipment \$23,100,000 in 5 per cent equipment trust certificates.

These have all been sold in Wall street subject to the commission's approval.

Among the types of rolling stock which the company will purchase are 119 locomotives, some of them electric and more than some freight cars.

found in carrying a keg of moonshine down the path to where their car was parked.

The officers have information that two barrels of mash had been run in the present location of the plant. Each barrel of mash is estimated to make about five gallons of moonshine so that each run resulted in the manufacture of approximately 100 gallons of the finished product which is said to be worth between \$1.00 and \$1.10.

The trip was made into the mountain country yesterday, and the officers and their three prisoners arrived back in Pendleton last night after dark. A bulldog was secured as a part of the stuff brought back, the mash being destroyed. Chief Taylor said today that the bulldog, used as a watch dog, should not be returned to the defendants any more than the big copper still or the wet goods.

An effort to confiscate the dog will be made by the chief, as he expects to put up to Judge Fitzgerald, the

ROME (INS)—The amazing sight of couples fox trotting to the accompaniment of a jazz band round the bier of a funeral cortege caused the intervention of the police at Udine, in Northern Italy.

It was explained to the police that the funeral was that of a prominent barber, who in his will had requested that his body should be accompanied to the graveside by a jazz band playing the liveliest music obtainable. The funeral procession it appeared, had started out decorously enough, but the dance music at last proved irresistible to the younger couples, with the above result.

The police thereupon took upon themselves the management of the rest of the ceremony.

Credits Red-Heads With Perseverance and Ambition

BERKELEY, Cal. (AP)—Red-haired persons make the best explorers and conquerors, contends Herbert E. Bolton, professor of American history at the University of California. He credits them with great initiative and persevering ambition.

The professor cites in support of his theory Columbus, Pedro de Alvarado,

the most noted of Cortes' assistants, and O'Connor, prominent in the expansion of the American southwest, all were graced with red hair.
