Three leading women and two leading men have the five principal roles in the Goldwyn all-star production of Leroy Scott's "Poverty to Riches." Besides this remarkable cast, the production was made by Reginald Barker.

The chief players, who have all been cast in leading roles of other Goldwyn pictures, are Leatrice Joy, Louise Lovely, Irene Rich, Richard Dix and John Bowers. shown in support of the love story, a heart-gripping romance of the two social worlds.

It is evident in the close-fitting smoothness of the scenes that "Merry-Go-Round" could easily have made a twelve-reel photoplay instead of a ten-reeler, but to avoid the tiresome effect that such lengthy features have on some people it was cut, and the result is wholly gratifying from either standpoint.

In the romantic leading roles Mary Philbin and Norman Kerry head the cast. She is a "discovery," and he an actor of noteworthy achievements, but both are convincingly sincere, and their harmony is attractive. George Hackathorne plays a hunchback character very well suited to his special ability for portrayals that have a keynote of pathos and tragedy.

Cesare Gravina, George Seigmann, Anton Vavrika—another "discovery" at Universal City—Edith Yorke, Dale Fuller, Lillian Sylvester, Dorothy Wallace, Spottiswoode Aitken, Al Edmundson, Maude George, Albert Conitt, Helen Bronaue, Jane Sherman, Charles L.
