WALL STREET WILL WAGER ON ELECTION

ture, is covering the short end by paying the premium of \$25,000.

Other heavy wagers are under way. And Wall Street, which believes itself to be the pulse not only of Big Business, but National Politics, is beginning to perk up interest in the election.

"As the stock market forecasts future business conditions," said De Chadenes in an executive interview with NEA Service for The Observer, "just so does Wall Street predict the political situation."

"The stock market seldom mistakes the trend of future business; neither does the betting fraternity err in its judgment regarding political outcomes."

"Of all the sources of getting political information, the betting barometer is by far the most reliable. For politicians and editors are influenced by their own personal likes, or by party loyalty. They may form faulty conclusions by constantly associating with their own political kind. But not so with the better. He weighs every situation and forms his judgment without being influenced by anything except hard facts. And he backs his judgment accordingly."

There has been a tightening of the odds since the first money on the campaign appeared in Wall Street last July.

Andrew W. Mellon, James E. Watson, Henry Cabot Lodge and Nathan L. Miller, former governor of New York, appeared among the leading Republicans. But they are not among the leading 12, either for the nomination or election, in the list now.

Among the Democrats Carter Glass, Hutchinson Colby, Senator Edward T. Edwards and Josephus Daniels have dropped.

It is expected that the odds will close up further as the time of the nominating conventions draw near.

"It isn't human nature," says De Chadenes "to start big betting when the decision as to who will be the respective candidates is still very much clouded. But betting interest will soon start picking up. I think that this campaign will probably set a record for betting."

Among the Democrats McAdoo and Senator Samuel M. Hays, whose strength seems to be increasing steadily, seem to have the best chance among the regulars.

"Ford is the unknown factor. But he odds on him are closing up rapidly. They were about 11-1 when the \$400,000 bet was made; and now they are 4-1. Cox, Al Smith and Senator Underwood are close behind."

Wheat Council Plans For Long Time Program

are necessary to put into force. The report of the committee does not purport to deal with the immediate situation confronting the wheat farmer, or with political measures to remedy that situation.

The program recommended in the committee report included: Gradual reduction of wheat acreage from 62,000,000 to 50,000,000 acres so as to place production on a domestic basis as fast as profitable alternatives can be introduced.

An increase in the domestic consumption of wheat foods. The standardization of varieties and seed selection to provide better production.

The committee voiced the opinion that the further development of co-operation on the part

of wheat farmers should be worked out as a part of a long-time program for the improvement of the production and marketing of his product and should not be expected to bring about an immediate adjustment of the discrepancy which exists between the prices which farmers receive for what they sell and the prices which farmers pay for what they buy.

All agencies sincerely interested in placing wheat production in this country on a permanently profitable basis should co-operate with federal and state forces in making the program effective, the committee report stated.

As a means of stimulating accomplishment of the adopted program, the committee recommended that the Wheat Council call together in con-

ference by states or by regions for the discussion and development of practical state or regional programs to be co-ordinated with the national program proposed and with other state and regional programs. The committee expressed belief that the Wheat Council could be of service in assembling material which will make possible discussions based upon facts rather than upon opinions and in acting as a clearing house and supporting publicity medium for information and studies bearing on the problem.
