"France, 6 battleships, 6 battle cruisers, 3 light cruisers, 1 destroyer, 11 torpedo boats and 20 submarines; Italy and Spain 14 battleships, 3 battle cruisers, 13 light cruisers, 8 destroyers, 72 torpedo boats and 51 submarines. Total units, France 49, Italy and Spain 145.
"The Mediterranean has become a Latin lake," adds the Matin.
"Mussolini's policy of national expansion," continues the paper, "has been so often clearly expressed that there is no need to dwell on it. The vigor and harshness with which Greece was dealt with at Corfu, the attitude of protest concerning the Albanian problem, the manner of dealing with Jugoslavia and Rumania, as well as the claims relative to Tangiers, without recalling other acts, show plainly that Italy intends to play a leading role in the Mediterranean."

board of railroad men general increase and that some opposed any increase at all."

Overtime Work Approved.

In dealing with rules, the board in the majority of instances reaffirmed previous decisions. It is believed that the payment of time and one-half for overtime will result in a material reduction in the amount of overtime work required. It is estimated by M. W. Hart, chief statistician, that if overtime work were required to the present extent under the new rule, (which is not expected) it would cost the companies \$449,623 a year. The board held that overtime work in addition to the eight-hour day by the classes of employees concerned in the decision is largely in the employer's control.

On the other hand, the board denied a request for punitive rates for work on Sundays and holidays. H. McAdoo, as director general of railroads during federal control, to the effect that such work was expected by the public, could not be avoided and should not be paid for on a punitive basis. It added that "the director general took steps to reduce Sunday work to a minimum, that railroad management 'as a rule, pursue the same course' and that this board has expressed a like desire."

crossed attendance in the schools and the decreased purchasing power of the dollar. Touching on the subject of teachers' salaries, he quoted figures for the present year and a decade ago. In 1913 the average salary for teachers in the U. S. was \$515 and the average now is \$827. The subject was discussed by Mr. Bailey of Elgin. He emphatically declared that most of the contention that the schools were costing too much was originating from men high up in this same vocation men who had lost touch with the modern public school and that most of the school patrons were not objecting to the school tax so much as they were to the other expenses, such as fees charged by professional men.

Mr. Price of Cove then entertained the institute with a short humorous account of the lack of teaching of etiquette in the high schools.

Mrs. Hess, primary teacher in the Union Schools, then gave a demonstration of primary reading. She had about a dozen little tots on the platform and they entered into the work just as if they were in the school room.

About the middle of the forenoon session the teachers enjoyed listening to a vocal solo by Miss Emma Baxter, a member of the teacher training class in the high school.

Mrs. John Wortman accompanied the soloist on the piano.

Miss Alice Marquardt, county health nurse read an interesting paper on "Conditions of Health Training and Play."

Professor J. S. Landers, president of the Oregon State Normal school at Monmouth, then wound up the morning program with an interesting address on "A New Emphasis in Education Today." He touched on domestic and foreign affairs which are so closely in need of ironing out, mentioning France, Italy, Germany, England and Turkey, then sketching the wonderful advances made in science, inventions, etc., he declared that the world was not ready to handle conditions.

He said it was like children playing with fire. The fundamental things in religion, education, government, society etc., were liberty, equality, justice, tolerance, and co-operation, and that the modern school must adjust itself to the task of stressing these essentials.

Immediately following this lecture the teachers and other visitors enjoyed a cafeteria lunch served by the domestic science girls.

Promptly at 1:30 Mrs. Ivanhoe called the meeting to order and our genial postmaster, Tony Smith, favored the institute with two vocal solos, "The Lamplight Hour" and "Mamma's Little Honey Bee," the latter a negro folk song. Mrs. Agnes Paddock then entertained the teachers with two of her well delivered readings, "Life in a Funny Proposition After All," and "Irish Names. Mrs. Edith Phyl sang two solos, "I Hear a Thrush at Eve" and "I Passed by Your Window."

After these entertaining number, the subject of Standard Tests was ably discussed by Supt. H. E. Inlow of the Pendleton city schools. Discussion of this topic was conducted by Supt. Conklin, W. V. Connor, and Mrs. John Wortman, of the local schools.

Departing somewhat from the scheduled program the girls of Miss Eslinger's domestic arts class displayed the dresses they had made since school began, showing that Miss Eslinger was doing a very practical work in this department. This display caused much favorable comment from the teachers.

Then the remainder of the afternoon session was turned over to Professor Landers who gave a wonderful address on the subject of Leadership an Invalid Car and Ambulance. Starting with a tribute to the work of the transfer of patients from hospital to hospital as the occasion may require.

of Coolidge, Harding, Roosevelt, and Wilson in this country and of Lloyd George and Clemenceau in Europe. He showed that though each was a great leader in his country at a critical time, the speaker declared that what was most needed was a world leader. From these political leaders he turned to the arts and sciences, educational and religious leadership, declaring that the only world leader or was the Christ. Each teacher needs to be a leader in the school and community and one of the crying needs of the schools today he declared to be that many who are otherwise great men, should take up the fight against the discoveries of science. Mr. Landers declared that truth is truth no matter from what source it is obtained, and that real science agreed with the Bible when properly studied. Professor Landers stated that the infidelity caused by students studying science should be guarded against by the teacher.

Just before the institute closed Supt. Inlow made a short plea for the teachers to join the State Teachers Association.

The entire program was very interesting and many of these present expressed the opinion that this was one of the best institutes they had attended for several years. County Supt. Ivanhoe closed the meeting by thanking the Union people for their entertainment and invited all the teachers to come to La Grande December 15, the date set for the second institute.

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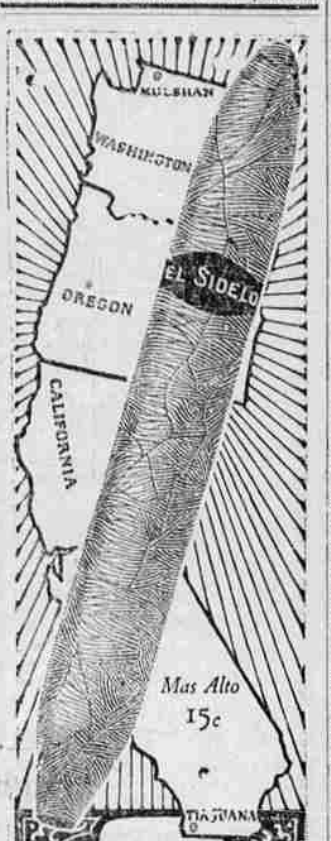
