La Grande To Battle Enterprise Thursday

Thanksgiving Game Will Usher Out 1923 Football Season for Local Team.

La Grande high school will wind up its 1923 gridiron season against Enterprise high school Thanksgiving Day on the local high school field. Anticipated spectators, although expected to be in the thousands, that La Grande, which has a team, has been having difficulty to meet the Blue and White team and are expected to give the Tigers some stiff opposition.

Enterprise invariably gives La Grande a hard fight. Two years ago Enterprise played La Grande here losing 7 to 0. Last year the La Grande Eastern Oregon champions defeated The Blue and Maroon team at Enterprise 44 to 0.

PUT MONUMENT ON BIRTHPLACE

Virginia Dare's Birthplace to Be Marked by State Monument.

MANHATTAN, N. Y. (AP)—A movement has been started by a group of citizens to permanently mark historical spots, and one of the places to be designated by a monument, if the plan materializes, is the birthplace of Virginia Dare, the first white child born in American soil. The spot is on Roanoke Island, often referred to as "The Grave of the English race in America." There is some doubt as to the exact spot where Virginia Dare was born, but it is believed to be on Fort Raleigh, about three miles north of Manteo.

Monuments of earth forming the sides of a peninsula, on each angle of which is a stone, rest protruding about a foot from the ground show the location of the old fort. In the center of the fort there is now an unpretentious stone marker on which is inscribed some of the historical records of the place. Enthusiastic relic collectors have marked the present stone marker, but no inscription will can be read.

The county of which Roanoke Island is a part is named Dare, in honor of the first English child born in America, and the seat of the county is named Manteo in honor of the Indian chief who was the first person to be baptized in the new land. Manteo enjoys the distinction of being the only county seat in the United States, with the single exception of Key West Fla., located on an island.

Today, the island is sparsely settled. The inhabitants make a livelihood by fishing. There is little farming. In fact, it is said that there is only one commercial farmer on the whole is-

land, which is 12 miles long and about three miles wide. The North Carolina State Department of Education and the State Historical Commission in order to honor the people the history of Roanoke Island in pictorial form, in 1921 had the settlement of the island sketched and photographed in 5,000 feet of motion picture film.

Cuban Business Men Plan World-Wide Fair

HAVANA, (AP)—Cuban business men will seek to bring together the world's producers, sellers and buyers in an International Sample Fair to be held in Havana February 2-24, 1924. Almost all branches of industry are to be represented under the plans of the fair organization which is headed by Frank Steinhart, an American who has been in business here since the war with Spain.

Efforts are being made to enlist the aid of chambers of commerce in the United States, all Latin-American and many European countries. The Cuban Minister of Agriculture, Commerce and Labor has promised to lend his aid. The fair will be held at the height of the tourist season, and the Cuban National Commission for Promotion of Touring has agreed to arrange the dates for the various winter sports and carnivals to coincide with the fair.

The exhibits will represent agricultural products and machinery, the automotive industry, textile products, furniture, clothing industry, tobacco and sugar, and almost all the products of the world that minister to man's wants or luxuries. If the first fair is a success, it probably will be made an annual event.
