HENRY CASE MUST SERVE ONE YEAR IN WALLAWA JAIL

WALLAWA.—That the way of the bootlegger and moonshiner can be made hard was proven to Henry Case who will spend the coming year in the county jail as a result of two convictions imposed upon him. To the six months in jail and \$250 fine imposed by Judge Conaway a week ago, Judge Knox added another six months Saturday. The latter sentence was inflicted on the charge of possessing a mash, to which he plead guilty. He still has the charge of possessing a still and liquor hanging over him, to which he also plead guilty before the grand jury. The first sentence by Judge Conaway was on the charge of selling moonshine. This indicates the severity of the laws enacted by the recent legislature.

Case, a young man of 19, has been the source of a great deal of trouble according to his neighbors. He has been manufacturing moonshine for some time on a wholesale scale, and has gained a bad reputation for his threatening methods in attempting to keep his business concealed. At the time of his arrest he displayed a revolver, which he decided not to use under the circumstances as Sheriff Rinehart and Deputy Tom Murray looked like they meant business.

paid into what is called the "pledge fund" subject to the rights of the reparation commission.

The subject has been raised as to what constitutes the reparation commission's rights. Part of the French press contends that the commission has nothing to do with these matters and that they are regarded as private and concerning only the separate action of France and Belgium in the Ruhr. The reparation commission, itself, is slow to pronounce on the question, since the solution of it involves the recognition of the occupation of the Ruhr with which certain members hold the commission has nothing to do, while the British delegate, Sir John Bradbury, has consistently opposed Ruhr contracts as well as the occupation.

Question Becoming Tangled
The opinion is gaining ground in the commission that the whole reparation question is becoming so tangled that the allies will be compelled to agree on some common policy or break on the question as soon as the British interior political situation has cleared.

that way. We must stand up and face the issue for we are largely responsible for the condition.

"In Pittsburgh, I am told, the getting party menaces has grown to such popularity in the high schools that the old graduates are returning to indulge in them during the noon hour.

"The condition is, however, the inevitable outgrowth of the period of history in which we are living. We who are in control are directly responsible.

"I will outline four reasons which seem to me to explain the situation. They are:

"First—The years of the great World War. Not a boy in the United States over 15 years of age escaped the effects of that struggle. Now we hear that the world is on the brink of another catastrophe. When we have made such a mess of things, what more can we expect?

"Second—The chaos in the moral and spiritual thought of older people. A new set of problems dealing with moral sanction and regarded as bad in the old days is being mulled over now.

"Third—Progress of the breakdown in marriage and the home. In 1922 in 21 States of the Union there was one divorce for every seven marriages. Someone has said that if the divorce rate continued to increase as it has in the past soon there will be more divorces than marriages.

"Fourth—The decline in the church of Christ. Denominationalism is the worst enemy to civilization today. There are today 214 distinct church organizations in the United States. That means waste and inefficiency.

"The trouble is that we have weakened our brains to make the church attractive for the young people, but have given them nothing to do."

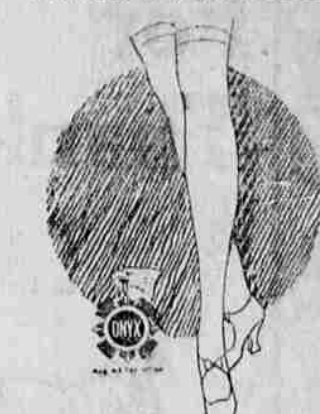
