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REOPEN ART COLLECTION

U. of O. Eugene, (Special)—The reopening of the Murray Warner art collection at the University of Oregon presenting for the public view, the large number of new gifts given this fall by Mrs. Warner, will be the occasion of a special university assembly Friday at 11 a. m. Dr. H. T. Williams, former director of the division of Far Eastern affairs in the Department of State, and now Associate Professor of Oriental languages and literature in the University of California, will be the principal speaker.

One of the foremost men in his field, Dr. Williams acted as adviser at the arms conference at Washington, D. C., and was an adviser at the peace conference in Paris.

While in the Orient last summer, Mrs. Warner obtained, in addition to the new pieces for the collection, a large number of objects which will supplement the already existing collections. For the Homecoming dedication only the Chinese section will be open to the public. The Japanese art works, including prints, lacquers, engravings, and tapestries, will be stored and not shown until next year.

A bronze memorial tablet dating back to the third Ming emperor, a marble statue of the God of Mercy, unearthed in a buried Chinese monastery in 1904, and a rare collection of Oriental bronzes, bronzes and china make up a small part of the gift.

Those which will be used to supplement the existing collections consist mainly of hand-dresses, boots and hats to complete the Manchu emperor's and empress' costumes. A complete Ming emperor's costume will be added. To increase the effectiveness of the display, the costumes of the former Chinese royal family will be placed on the size figures modeled by the University fine arts department.

Endeavors Lay Plans
EUGENE, Or.—Plans were laid at a luncheon given by the Christian Endeavor society of Eugene yesterday for the state convention to be held in this city April 16 to 19. Paul Brown, president of the state society, met workers and outlined plans for the big meeting.

A local union was formed, with two representatives from each society in the city as a cabinet, and officers were elected as follows: President, Roy Long; vice-president, Ronald Heston; and secretary, Harvey Plumb. The officers will choose a general committee to have charge of arrangements.

Crossing Hearing Held.
ROSEBURG, Or.—Public Service Commissioners Corey and Campbell today heard the petition of the Roseburg city council for permission to construct an overhead crossing at the extension of South street to connect

with a proposed bridge across the South Umpqua river to Umpqua Park addition. The Southern Pacific company is holding out for an under-grade crossing at the site of the South Roseburg trestle, about a quarter of a mile up stream from the present site of the proposed bridge.

CUTS OFF SON'S HAND BECAUSE HE WAS THIEF

MOSCOW, (U.S.A.)—A Russian woman, the wife of a railway worker at Kiev, has been sentenced to three years' imprisonment for cutting off the right hand of her thirteen-year-old son. The mother testified that her son was an habitual thief and that she cut off his hand to cure him. The son, it was brought out at the trial, admitted to the matron, blindfolded, because he feared further beatings at the hands of his mother. Because her family of five children needed her attention the mother was paroled.

RUNNIN' WATER THWARTS FROST IN LETTUCE PATCH

Bond House Files Suit.

SALEM, Or.—Mandamus proceedings have been filed in the supreme court to compel the state corporation commissioner to issue in the Western Bond & Mortgage company, with headquarters in Portland, a permit to sell securities in the amount of approximately \$1,000,000.

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curties the bond and mortgage company must qualify under the building and loan act. It was because of the company's failure to comply with this act that the commissioner refused to issue the permit.

City Must Pay \$2500

ASTORIA, Or.—As a result of the recent supreme court decision in the case of Christina Kalkren and others against the city of Astoria the city will be compelled to pay the plaintiffs judgment and interest, amounting to about \$2500.

The three cases were brought to recover damages for injury to property resulting from a landslide on

Thune avenue. The city was charged with negligence. They were tried before juries in the local circuit court and judgments obtained. The city then appealed to the higher court but Norblad & Hesse, attorneys for the

plaintiffs, asked the supreme tribunal to dismiss the appeal on the ground that the transcript on appeal had not been filed within the time specified by the law. It was this motion to dismiss that the supreme court allowed.

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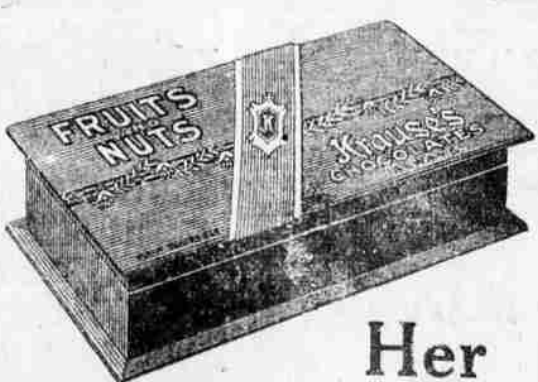


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
