Gil Dobie as Coach Has Unique Record Of Winning Elevens

NEW YORK, (AP)—A unique football coach with a remarkable record in Gilmore Dobie, now serving his seventeenth year as a builder of successful football teams, the last four of which he has lifted Cornell to the pinnacle of gridiron glory.

In the 16 years prior to 1923, Dobie coached elevens won 31 victories, scored three times as many points as but three times, rolling up a grand total of 2,221 points as against the 252 for their opponents. And, as this season has witnessed other Dobie victories and the scoring of more than 200 points by his Cornell eleven, his list of triumphs now is close to 50 and the total points scored by his team is well over the 3000 mark.

As "Gloomy Gil" he is known and referred to by eastern football writers and that sobriquet is made the subject of a sketch appearing in a recent issue of the Cornell Alumni News. The article takes issue with writers which have depicted Dobie as a morose, and somewhat profane individual. It states that while he can "cuss" on occasions and does, he "cusses out" the play and not the players. It adds his players have unbounded confidence in him and that the faculty agree he is an inspirational leader.

Dobie began his coaching career in 1905 at Minneapolis High School. The next year he became coach of North Dakota Agricultural College, and in 1908 he signed as head coach at the University of Washington, serving in that capacity to 1913. In 1917 he came coach at Annapolis, and remained at the Naval Academy until 1920 when he was signed by Cornell. In that period Georgetown, which defeated his 1919 Navy team 6 to 0, Dartmouth which defeated his 1920 Cornell team 14 to 0 and Pennsylvania, which defeated that same team, 28 to 0, have been the only institutions to boast a victory over "Gloomy Gil."

The secret of the success of the Dobie system of football play has been described as follows: "Dobie's coaching method, or rather the style of play that he develops has the peculiar quality of absolute precision that goes with definite cadence, not unlike that of a crack drill squad going through the manual of arms. The marvelous thing about it is that it goes ahead unerringly in the midst of the confusion of charging lines and strenuous physical combat."

"On a given play each member of the team has definite duties to perform in a perfect routine and he takes his two steps in one direction and two in another as infallibly and accurately as if there were no one else on the field."

Motion Picture Story Of Elinor Glyn's "Six Days" Coming To Arcade Thursday.

An original motion picture story by the English novelist, Elinor Glyn, famous for her novel, "Three Weeks," is coming to the Arcade theatre on Thursday for three days. It is called "Six Days" and has been pictured by Goldwyn under the direction of Charles Brabin, who made "Driven," one of last season's biggest successes. In a last frantic effort to escape, Dion and Lalline fall into a chalk mine underneath the dungeon, become separated and each is finally rescued. Lalline's mother takes her back to England and by threatening to kill herself unless Lalline consents to marry Sir Charles, forces her into a second marriage. Later Dion, recovered in body and mind, goes to claim Lalline.

Goldwyn gave Director Brabin an unusually notable cast with Corinne Griffith as Lalline; Frank Mayo as Dion Leslie; Claude King as Sir Charles Chetwyn and Myrtle Stedman as Lalline's mother. Others in the cast are Maude George, Spottiswoode Alken, Charles Gray, Evelyn Walsh Hall, Robert de Villibus, Paul Cazenave and Jack Herbert.
