

Oregon Dairymen to Meet To Solve Some Problems

Importance of dairying, problems of production and marketing, and relation of this industry to the whole scheme of agriculture in Oregon, will form one phase of the program of the state agricultural economic conference to be held at the state college January 21 to 25 next.

Oregon dairymen are faced with the problem of marketing the state's ever increasing surplus of dairy products. The terms of marketing most dairymen will be discussed.

Whether to concentrate on the manufacture of butter under a state brand or to increase production of American cheese, or to encourage greater home consumption of milk and cream, are important economic questions, dairy leaders think.

Are present methods of marketing dairy products adequate, or should they be better adapted to present conditions? This is one of the questions the conference will be called upon to answer.

Leading dairymen of Oregon are expected to attend and help find answers to these problems, and dairy authorities of national reputation will be present to assist in making the right answer.

The conference will be in charge of a special committee of Paul V. Martin, director of the extension service, James T. Jardine, director of the experiment station, and Hester McPherson, professor of economics and sociology. Other committees will help look out for the needs of the dairymen and see that the resources of the college plant are available for their use.

Other general subjects to engage special attention are crops of fruits and vegetables, beef, hogs and sheep, poultry, land settlement and reclamation. Oregon producers, college specialists, and national leaders will unite in seeking solutions to the various problems.

Motion Picture Story Of Elinor Glyn's "Six Days" Coming To Arcade Thursday.

An original motion picture story by the English novelist, Elinor Glyn, famous for her novel, "Three Weeks," is coming to the Arcade Theatre on Thursday for three days. It is called "Six Days" and has been pictured by Goldwyn under the direction of Charles Brabin, who made "Fanny," one of last season's biggest successes. Mr. Brabin is said to have surpassed his own previous excellent direction in "Six Days."

"Six Days" tells the story of Laine Kingston, whose mother, left penniless by the business failure and suicide of her husband, schemes to marry Laine to Sir Charles Chetwyn of an old and wealthy English family. While in Paris, Laine meets and falls in love with Dion Leslie, son of a famous actress. Dion is in reality Sir Charles' son, his mother having left Sir Charles shortly after the boy's birth. After visiting the grave of her brother on one of the battlefields of France, Laine and Dion, accompanied by a priest as a guide, are trapped in one of the old German dungeons. Unable to make their escape and facing death through the exhaustion of air in six days, Laine and Dion are married by the priest just before his death. In a last frantic effort to escape, Dion and Laine fall into a chalk mine underneath the dungeon, become separated and each is finally rescued. Laine's mother takes her back to England and by threatening to kill herself unless Laine consents to marry Sir Charles, forces her into a second marriage. Later Dion, recovered in body and mind, goes to claim Laine.

Goldwyn gave Director Brabin an unusually notable cast with Corinne Lashley, Claude King as Sir Charles Chetwyn and Myrtle Stedman as Laine's mother. Others in the cast are Maude George, Spottswode Allen, Charles Cary, Evelyn Walsh Hall, Robert de Villiers, Paul Cazenave and Jack Herbert.

The picture is brimful of action and drama and has a number of spectacular scenes.
