**Woodcocks.**  
Paris. (E.N.S.)—October has gone and the woodcock is just appearing in the forests of France. This means that woodcock hunters are busy as well as their husbands-hunters.

Feather and singe the fine birds and cover with thin slices of bacon. Put on a spit and turn for five minutes before the fire. Remove the fat and put in the dripping pan a little chicken consommé with salt and pepper. Cook three minutes longer, basting with all the time.

Into the dripping pan put slices of toasted bread. Twelve minutes more of roasting, allowing the fat to drip upon the toast. Baste constantly so that the bird does not dry. Remove from the spit and serve the birds on the toast.

**Protest Porto Rican Budget.**  
SAN JUAN, P. R. (AP)—Porto Rican sugar growers, through the Sugar Producers' association, have addressed a letter of protest against the present \$12,000,000 budget and the \$4,000,000 bond issue jointly to Gov. Towson, the president of the senate and the speaker of the house. The budget, the largest in the island's history, and the bond issue to provide for public improvements were approved by the last legislature.

The growers complain also of the special export tax on sugar, which they point out will come directly out of the pockets of the producers because they will not be able to pass the tax on to the consumer.

**River Road Upkeep Aired.**  
GREEN CITY, Or.—Petitions asking the state highway department to assume responsibility for upkeep of the River road, are being circulated in the north end of the county, and are being signed. The petition will be presented to the state highway commissioners at their meeting in Portland by a delegation of residents of the district between Jennings Lodge and Milwaukie, who will try to induce the department to grant the desired relief.

## Automobile Helps Make Laplanders Prosper

**ARISKO, Swedish Lapland. (AP)**—Santa Claus will move southward this year with an unusually fat and sleek lot of reindeer. There was an abundance of snow last winter, and rains have been frequent throughout the year in the mountain ranges over which the Laps herd their charges. Consequently the moss, the scanty grass which survives the climate of the land north of the Arctic Circle and the small birch and shrubs have provided the reindeer with more than the average amount of forage.

The increase of tourist travel thru Lapland as a result of new automobile roads has brought prosperity to many Laplanders. Travelers are now leaving the excursion ships at various points in the Norwegian fjords and inspecting the land of the midnight sun at close range. Touring agencies have arranged camps on many picturesque lakes overlooked by glaciers and venturesome mountain climbers are wandering far away from the beaten trail.

Like American Indians, the Laps are becoming more and more commercialized in the line of travel. Many of them are becoming professional Laps, and they reap a harvest in tourist season selling reindeer skins and reindeer clothing to the visitors.

This has been an especially good year, as steamer traffic into the far north assumed pre-war proportions. Even the German shipping companies renewed their excursions into the land of the midnight sun. Then the Gotteburg exposition attracted large numbers of Americans and Englishmen who made the rail trip from South Sweden to the northern mountains whose primitive population afford such a striking contrast to the highly-developed civilization and culture of the southern half of the Scandinavian peninsula.

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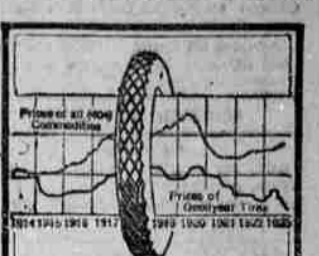
