DUAL GOVERNMENT MAKES TEXARKANA UNIQUE U. S. CITY

TEXARKANA, Tex. (AP)—When the governor of Texas comes to Texarkana one-half of the city celebrates, and when the governor of Arkansas makes an official visit it means a holiday for the other half of the city. The reason for this is that Texarkana is divided by an imaginary line running north and south in the middle of an avenue named State Line. On one side of the line the city is governed by the laws of Texas; on the other side by the laws of Arkansas.

The portoffice straddles the state line as does the railroad station. Letters are formally addressed "Texarkana, Texas-Ark." and mail clerks grow nimble jumping from one state to another. There are two full sets of county offices, two mayors, two city councils, two police departments, two police courts, two health departments, two United States courts, each occupying its own federal building, two United States Commissioners and two United States bankruptcy courts.

About the only things publicly owned that serve both halves of the city are the fire department, individually owned by separate units by each city, one operated as one department under one fire chief, and a joint sewage disposal plant. The same utility companies also serve both parts of the town.

Another dual overhead expense in the maintenance of two distinct school systems. Lodge and church organizations and also fraternal and clubs maintain separate establishments.

The entire burden of government rests on a population of 20,000.

Because of its dual form of government Texarkana is believed to be unique among American cities. The name of the city was combined from the first three letters of Texas, the first three of Arkansas and the last three of Louisiana. The city will have a public celebration of its half-century of progress December 3 to 5.

SAY INDIANS NEED CHILD HEALTH AID

NEW YORK. (INS)—Many deaths among Indian infants and older children could be avoided if their mothers were given adequate instruction how to care for them according to American Child Health Association, which plans to co-operate with the United States Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Minnesota State Board of Health in this work among the Chippewas in Minnesota.

The work will undoubtedly branch out to include other Indian tribes, the association reports, since co-operation is promised from Government, State and county bodies.

Dr. A. J. Chesley, executive officer of the Minnesota State Board of Health, writing to a child health expert of Rochester, Minn., says: "Probably you have seen the homes of the Indians and know the great amount of unnecessary sickness and loss of life among the infants and older children due to lack of instruction as to proper care. Those who have lived among the Indians agree that they always show a deep interest in the welfare of their children. The Indian mothers particularly are devoted, and we think that by having a Chippewa nurse, who thoroughly understands the conditions, go into the home and help a mother with a sick child a promising beginning will be made toward improvement of general health conditions among all the Indians."

Protest Porto Rican Budget.
SAN JUAN, P. R. (AP)—Porto Rican sugar growers, through the Sugar Producers' association, have addressed a letter of protest against the present \$12,000,000 budget and the \$6,000,000 bond issue jointly to Gov. Towner, the president of the senate and the speaker of the house. The budget, the largest in the island's history, and the bond issue to provide for public improvements were approved by the last legislature.

The growers complain also of the special export tax on sugar, which they point out will come directly out of the pockets of the producers because they will not be able to pass the tax on to the consumer.

River Road Upkeep Asked.
OREGON CITY, Or.—Petitions asking the state highway department to assume responsibility for upkeep of the River road are being circulated in the north end of the county, and eagerly signed. The petition will be presented to the state highway commissioners at their meeting in Portland by a delegation of residents of the district between Jennings Lodge and Milwaukee, who will try to induce the department to grant the desired relief.

PENN-CORNELL ANNUAL CLASH HARD TO DOPE

PHILADELPHIA.—One of the successful holiday dishes for the Eastern palate will be served hot off the gridiron at Franklin Field this afternoon, the occasion being the annual clash between Pennsylvania and Cornell, rivals by environment, tradition and preference. The game will mark the end of the 1923 season for both teams, with Cornell striving to preserve inviolate its unbeaten record and Pennsylvania out to redeem a rather "spotty" season, numbering defeats by Maryland, Lafayette and Penn State.

As matters stand the Big Red outfit looks to be 2 to 1 a better team than Pennsylvania, and the odds have conformed accordingly. Past performances, however, have ever proved a fallacy in dealing with the Penn-Cornell series, seemingly inferior Red and Blue eleven often arising to this holiday occasion and playing Cornell right off its beaverted feet. Only between the seasons of 1913 to 1915 and from 1921 to the present has Cornell shown to advantage.

Unbeaten Team.
The present ensemble from Cayuga's classic shores is rated as one of the best in the country. It has not been beaten since Thanksgiving Day three years ago, when it collapsed before Pennsylvania and finished a bad second. This is a remarkable record in these modern days of football upsets; yet there is no denying the fact that Cornell schedules might be strenuous. Until the present year most of its opponents were distinctly second rate, but recent achievements have been more commendable. Included among Cornell's victims this season are Dartmouth, which beat Harvard, and Colgate, which took a rolling fall out of Syracuse, one of the East's leading teams until the moment in question.

Both Dartmouth and Colgate were all but overwhelmed by the power of the Cornell attack, built around the off-tackle runs of Pfann and Cassidy. Pfann is rated as one of the greatest backs of the last ten years, and Pennsylvania will stop 89 per cent of the Red offensive if it can prevent his young man from getting away. This is asking Penn to do what Colgate, Dartmouth, Columbia and other teams have failed to accomplish. Pfann has not been stopped this year.

"In-And-Out."
Penn has been the prize in-and-out of the season, losing to Maryland, barely pulling out a victory over Swarthmore, then turning around and beating Columbia and Centre College in a romp. This was followed by a 6 to 0 decision over Pittsburgh, upon which the Red and Blue lost to Lafayette, which had previously been beaten by Pitt. In its last game Penn proved to be 21 points worse than Penn State, which lost to Syracuse, a team beaten by Colgate, the lower to Cornell.

This would seem to make Pennsylvania about 50 points removed from Cornell at its best. But, as previously remarked, the past performance was over a mare and a delusion so far as the Penn-Cornell series is concerned.

Highway Tax Favored.

MARSHFIELD.—People of the lower Umpqua river have gone on record as favoring a 10-mill tax to connect Hoodport with the Pacific highway at Drain. The grading on the road between Hoodport and Scottsburg, head of navigation on the Umpqua river, is finished except a 1-2 miles of difficult construction. The vote on the project was 250 to 71. The road is to receive about \$55,000 of forestry money and the connection for outlet should be ready by the fall of 1924.
