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CRISIS ENDS
IN GERMANY;
MARX NAMED3-Party Bloc, Headed by
Dr. Marx, Clerical
Leader, in Control.CABINET FORMED BY
AID OF 2 PARTIESSeven - Day Parliamentary
Crisis Finally Terminated
on Thanksgiving Day.

BERLIN, (AP).—Official announcement of the formation of a new three-party coalition cabinet for Germany with Dr. Wilhelm Marx as chancellor and ex-Chancellor Brüning as ex-chancellor. Stresemann as foreign minister was made today.

BERLIN (By the Associated Press).—The seven day parliamentary crisis, which was chiefly devoted to inter-party bickerings and barterings and an abortive attempt definitely to do away with socialist influences in national politics through the election of a bourgeois bloc terminated Thursday night in a three party compromise by virtue of which a minority coalition, comprising members of the Clerical, the German People's and the Democratic parties will succeed the deposed Stresemann government which was constituted with the same component parts.

Dr. Wilhelm Marx, the Clerical leader, will hold the new cabinet as chancellor while the other portfolios will be held by men who were in the last government.

SENATE G. O. P.
STANDS FIRMRepublicans Leave Initiative
in Organization Battle
to Other Parties.

WASHINGTON, (AP).—Conferees to be held Friday by the Republican Progressive bloc of the house and senate may point the way to the extent of opposition the regular Republican organizations will encounter in their efforts to organize promptly the two houses.

Senate Republican leaders apparently have determined to leave to the both, the initiative in any organization battle to the Progressive bloc, or not force an election without the union fight. They are agreed to adhere to the position that the senate is organized and the election of a pro-silent bloc is unnecessary. The Progressive bloc take an opposite position but the general belief is that they can support of the Progressive bloc.

Republican leaders in the house apparently are not concerning themselves with the Progressive bloc. They say they have received no official information as to plans of the Progressive bloc to make overtures looking to an adjustment of differences in advance of a vote for speaker.

The Progressive bloc has issued invitations to 60 members of the house to attend their conference Friday at which the program drafted by the executive committee of the bloc would be discussed and acted upon. This includes not only a liberalization of house rules and committees but also legislation, including tax reduction and the railroad question.

La Grande-Wallowa Lake
Highway Open All Winter

ENTERPRISE.—The Wallowa Lake-La Grande highway will be kept open with little interruption throughout the winter unless exceptionally heavy snow comes. In the prediction of William Miller, highway foreman, and the Enterprise recorder last week, Mr. Miller now has confidence in the road maintenance from a point four miles east of Elgin to Wallowa. His winter headquarters will be at Minam.

The Minam hill will constitute a new slide are expected to fill the road in places, but Mr. Miller will be supplied with sufficient men and machinery to keep this cleared out under any ordinary winter conditions. It is probable that a big enterprise will be started at some point on the hill. The Wallowa canyon is also a high snow district with frequent drifts occurring during the winter with slides at some points.

At present the state highway department has authorized the use of snow sheds for erosion near the Highland school and additional plans will probably be provided soon. Mr. Miller is getting the plans ready to set up

SAMUEL CANAK
LAID TO RESTMan Injured Near Telocaset
Some Time Ago Called
Beyond Wednesday Evening.

Samuel Canak, Slav, who was injured some time ago mysteriously at Telocaset, passed on at Hot Lake Wednesday evening. An autopsy conducted after his demise found that death was due to hydropneumothorax and a contributory cause, injuries received in the accident at Telocaset. Funeral services were held this afternoon at three o'clock from the Bohlenkamp chapel. Interment was in the Masonic cemetery. The deceased left a considerable estate, probably several thousand dollars, according to his relatives. He is survived by a brother and father who made their home at Bingham Canyon, Utah. His brother has been at Hot Lake with him for the past few days.

Medical examination prior to his death disclosed the fact that Canak was insane at the time the accident occurred. The belief is that Canak, mentally deranged, attempted to kill himself at Telocaset although some believe that he was injured in a holdup or in an accident. Following the accident or attempted suicide, whichever it was, he was brought to Hot Lake where medical efforts could not ward off death.

Detroit Outplays Gonzaga Grid

DETROIT, (AP).—The University of Detroit put a brilliant finish to a mediocre season Thursday by defeating Gonzaga university of Spokane, Wash., 13 to 7. LA GRANDE 'II'
ENDS SEASON
WITH VICTORYEnterprise Defeated 79 to 0
Before Thanksgiving Day
Crowd; Garity Stars.

(By Scoop) Three score and 19 points to nothing! Such was the score of the Enterprise-La Grande high school football game played here yesterday, Thanksgiving Day, closing the season. Incidentally, by defeating the Enterprise eleven by 79 points La Grande high school ran her total number of points scored this year against high school teams to 244 and only 20 points were scored against the Tigers. The Blue and White team came in to their own victory, kicked the old dope bucket galley-west and snowed the Black and Maroon under a dozen touchdowns, every one earned. Dopesters, on all available statistics, had figured La Grande winner by about four touchdowns providing the game was played on a muddy field—which it was. But the Tigers didn't give a snap and a whoop for "dope" and romped through the opposing line, raced around the ends, forward passed and made parades at will until it appeared as if touchdowns were the only thing La Grande knew how to make.

First Half Hard Fought. The entire game found Enterprise, a lighter but trickier team, trying gamely to score, mostly via the forward pass method. They constantly attempted to get one over for a large gain and although they completed many, none put them in a real position to get away from the "goose-egg" column.

In the first half of the game La Grande found the going hard. Only four touchdowns were contributed and Enterprise had the ball in their possession a considerable share of the time. But when the Tigers started clawing down all opposition in the third quarter things assumed a different aspect. Four touchdowns came that period and sent the score up to 46 to 0.

In the final period the La Grande players were not to be stopped. Three touchdowns followed, each other with startling quickness and with eight minutes to play La Grande, despite the fact that the ball was so muddy that it was almost impossible to keep from fumbling some, managed to push across two more, ending the game with an even dozen touchdowns and making the score 79 to 0. Twelve touchdowns accounted for 72 points and seven conversions out of 12 tries were successful.

Garity Starred.

Bob Garity, blurring fullback, executed his trademark yardage on the field. Every man on the local line-up exhibited excellent, aggressive football but Garity came into his own and loomed up as a stellar performer like a whole backfield by itself. Garity reeled off great gains through the line, around the end, off tackle, via the forward passing route, returning punts and also intercepted an Enterprise pass and went about 20 yards opening the way to an easy touchdown. In the final quarter Garity carried a kickoff from his 35-yard line across the goal line but the ball was brought back to the 10-yard line where Bob was forced over by an opponent. Bob scored about half of the points La Grande made.

Garity was not alone in stellar work however. Starting with the line every man, from wing to wing, did his job in a way that left no doubt but that La Grande team was there and over. Williams and Lynch, ends, worked beautifully. Williams once catching a pass and galloping 50 yards to a touchdown. McArthur and Coker were through the line every time, fighting like tigers. Coker converted many points after touchdowns.

Stager, Smuts and Hughes, at guard position, never failed to take care of their opponents in the most approved style. And Hummel at center did his share. On the whole the line covered themselves with plenty of glory. The backfield performed just as well, with the 75-point Sherwood and Kerr, halfbacks, made plentiful

DROP PROPOSALNo Action Taken by City
Dads on Proposed Contract
Due to Advise of
Attorney.

Consideration of a proposed contract submitted to them for the purchase of bonds contemplated in connection with the proposed La Grande water system, which was discussed at a prior meeting, by the city commissioners Wednesday evening in regular session resulted in no action being taken. The city attorney advised the commission that no such steps could be taken legally unless the city charter was amended.

A petition was also presented Wednesday evening, signed by 27 La Grande citizens, protesting against the dark corners near the Greenwood school house. They alleged that strangers frequented these dark spots and asked that lights be installed to do away with these occurrences. The city commission is to take the matter up with the school board and will give the board any co-operation within their power.

Penn Defeated in Desperate Battle
PHILADELPHIA (By the Associated Press).—Cornell quipped Pennsylvania Thursday on Franklin, 14 to 7, in one of the most thrilling and desperately fought battles these ancient gridiron rivals have waged in the last 20 years.

Picked by critics to run roughshod over the Quakers, Duke's "big red" juggernaut was held at bay for the greater part of the game by an alert brilliant Penn defense and won by the narrow margin of a single touchdown until the final whistle.

EVENTS IN RUHR
AFFECT ARIZONA
COPPER INDUSTRY

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP).—Events in the Ruhr are reflected more profoundly in Arizona than in that of any other state, according to P. G. Spillbury, president of the Arizona Industrial congress. He said this was because copper is the backbone of Arizona's prosperity.

In a recent address Mr. Spillbury stated: "On an average, Germany bought 233,000,000 pounds of copper a year before the war. Her maximum purchases in one year reached about 400,000,000 pounds, or almost as great as Arizona's annual output. Now France is not permitting Germany to export her manufactured products, with the result that Germany's purchases have ceased."

FIVE KILLED IN
STORM IN STATE
OF LOUISIANA

HOUMA, La. (AP).—Five persons lost their lives, five were injured and heavy property damage resulted, from a storm which swept the Little Calumet bayou section, 14 miles south of here Wednesday night.

The family of Ralph Guilty was wiped out. Mr. Guilty, his wife, 19-year-old son and 12-year-old daughter having been killed when their home was wrecked. The fifth death was that of Katherine Brunett, 12-year-old, who drowned when a house boat in which the family made its home overturned. The parents escaped.

Approximately 25 houses were wrecked, including the \$22,000 Lauche schoolhouse. Crops were badly damaged by rain which accompanied the storm. The weather bureau reported top inches of rainfall between 5 a. m. Wednesday and 2 a. m. Thursday.

POLICE FIND
NELL AUSTIN
IN VANCOUVERSeattle Teacher Uncon-
scious in Hospital; Was
Found on WaterfrontSISTERS DENY THAT
FRICTION EXISTEDSeattle Police Claim That
Miss Austin Left Home
Voluntarily Due to Family
Trouble.

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP).—The sisters of Nellie Austin, who arrived here to take her back to her Seattle home from which she vanished Sunday night, denied that friction between themselves and her existed. Two Seattle policemen who came here to identify her after she was found unconscious in a hospital here after being picked up on the waterfront said the trouble between her sisters and her caused her disappearance. She is still unconscious and is suffering from exposure, although she had suffered no violence.

SEATTLE (AP).—The police of Vancouver, B. C., have positively identified a young woman in the general hospital there as Miss Nell Austin, 23-year-old Seattle school teacher who disappeared from here last Sunday night according to information received by Seattle authorities Thursday night. The woman, who is delirious and talks incoherently, was identified by photographs of Miss Austin sent to Vancouver and by two of Miss Austin's friends who called at the hospital. The friends asked for permission to remove Miss Austin to her home.

Police Capt. C. G. Baunick of Seattle notified the British Columbia authorities Thursday night that the young woman should not be removed to the homes of friends and that she should remain under the care of authorities at the hospital until relatives of Miss Austin go to Vancouver together.

The police of Point Grey, B. C., a suburb of Vancouver, reported late Thursday that they had found Miss Austin unconscious in a street near the waterfront Wednesday night and had taken her to the hospital in a desecrated condition. The information was sent here by Sgt. W. E. Carr and Patrolman S. E. Jennings of Seattle who left here by automobile at midnight.

The Seattle officers telegram stated that Miss Austin was clad in a khaki walking suit, a pair of gray hiking hose and low tan shoes. It stated that she was suffering from exhaustion.

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URGE COOLIDGE
TO MAKE RACEG. O. P. Leaders Exert
Pressure to Secure
Definite Announcement From
Chief.

WASHINGTON, (AP).—With the return to Washington of Republican leaders for the opening of congress, pressure for an early definite announcement by President Coolidge of whether he will seek the presidential nomination in 1936 is being increased and some of his friends believe he will settle the question soon.

Many of the president's supporters have visited him recently and urged him to make an announcement of his candidacy at an early date, but so far he has contented himself with listening to advice without giving an intimation of his course. Notwithstanding this, however, and although the president has remained inactive, his friends in several states have taken steps in a preliminary way for his entry into the presidential race.

Oregon Judge To Serve
Jail Term; Was Drunk

THE DALLAS, Or. (AP).—Released on his own recognizance under promise to return here December 6 to serve a sentence of 30 days in the county jail and pay a fine of \$250 after his plea of guilty Wednesday of possessing intoxicating liquor, Henry D. Keyes, county judge of Wheeler county, was free Thursday to return to his home at Fossil to celebrate Thanksgiving.

In court here Wednesday, J. W. Allen, justice of peace, who has known Keyes from boyhood, in pronouncing judgment, said: "A man who will go out on the highway drunk and driving an automobile where others have met death and terrible injuries as the result of careless driving, has not any more business to do than a man has to go down on the street with a rifle and begin shooting."

Judge Keyes, who was arrested Tuesday on a highway near here by traffic officers who testified in court that he was intoxicated, said he had purchased the liquor from Louis Count of The Dalles. He said that the wine found in his car was for private use. Count pleaded guilty to the charge of supplying Keyes with the liquor and was fined \$250.
