Alice Brady in "Red Head" At Sherry's Theatre Today Only

Alice Brady's splendid starring feature, "Red Head," is decidedly human, charming and entertaining. It tells a story of a wealthy young man, a good-for-nothing, who marries a cabaret girl named Dazie, alias "Redhead," when both are under the influence of liquor. She proceeds to make a man of him, and despite strenuous opposition, succeeds in doing it.

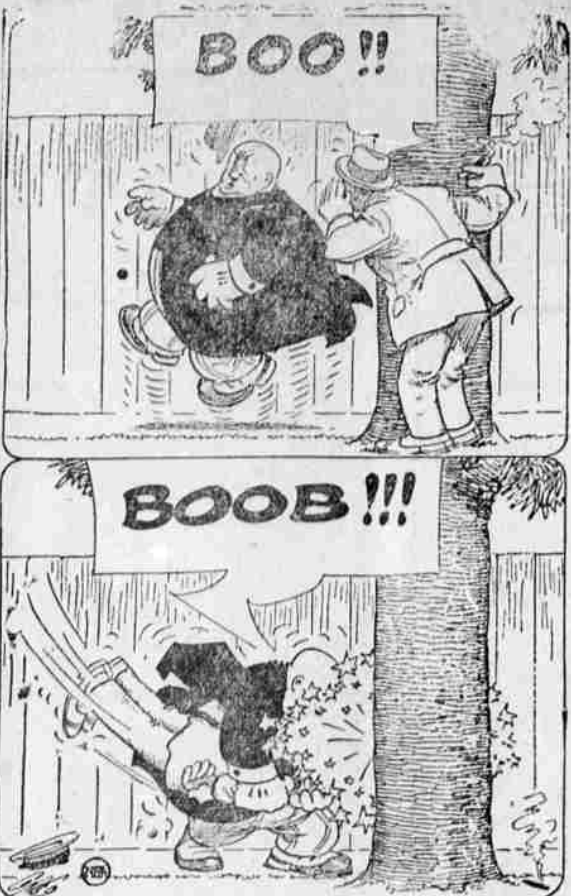
