

WILL ADDRESS TEACHERS MEET

Dr. E. B. Bryan, University of Ohio President, to Attend Oregon Teachers' Convention.

Dr. E. B. Bryan, President of the University of Ohio, one of the leading educators of the United States and well known as a brilliant platform orator has been secured as lecturer for the annual session of the Oregon State Teachers' Association by the President of the Association, Superintendent G. W. Ager, of Bend, according to messages that have been sent to Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe, Union county school superintendent.

The convention will be held in Portland at the Lincoln High School on December 27, 28, 29. For the general sessions efforts are being made to secure another speaker of equal rank with Doctor Bryan. The annual session will open at nine o'clock, Tuesday 27, with a meeting of the Representative Council. The work of the Council, which consists of acting upon all official reports of standing committees and of transacting all regular and special business of the Association, will occupy all of the first day. Only accredited delegates have the right to speak and vote during the deliberations of the Council, though the meetings are open to all visiting teachers.

The general session of the Association convenes at nine o'clock Friday morning, December 28. The opening address will be given by Dr. Bryan. From reports already received by officers of the Association, it is estimated that there will be more than two thousand teachers from all sections of Oregon in attendance at this session. Department meetings will be held Friday afternoon and Saturday morning, and the convention will close with a general assembly Saturday afternoon for which there has been provided an excellent program of special music and an address by one of the Eastern speakers.

PITTSBURG, (AP)—One of the outstanding upsets of the 1923 football season was recorded at Forbes Field Thursday when the University of Pittsburg machine, under the guiding hand of "Doc" Wagner, swamped the strong Penn State eleven, 29 to 2. The gridiron was extremely muddy, but Pitt unceremoniously aerial assaulted which State could not solve and the Panthers gained at will. State regis-

Spacy Williams Gets Year.

EUGENE, Or.—Sidney Williams, 65 of Cottage Grove was sentenced by Judge Bingham to the state prison for one year on a charge of possession of moonshine mash. He was arrested a number of months ago and escaped soon afterward from the county jail, but was rearrested at Marshfield about a week ago.

BOSTON, Mass.—Discrimination against world war veterans by State Auditor Alonzo B. Collins has been charged by the American Legion, which considers the appointment of Edmund Webber, a Boston man, to a position in Cook's office as an affront to former service men. So late were the veterans, that Gen. Clarence R. Edwards, department commander of the American Legion in Massachusetts, has declared that

he will take the stump in order to defeat Cook from returning to office.

The position is under civil service and pays \$1800 a year. Three veterans headed the service list, but were disregarded by the state official when he transferred Webber from a city office in Boston to the State position.

Lane Farms Bring \$70,000.
EUGENE, Or.—W. E. Kyler this week sold his 320-acre farm north of Irving to John Michelbrock of Richland, Wash., the consideration being about \$70,000, according to those interested in the deal.
