WASHINGTON, (AP)—Republican insurgents at the conference just before the House convened today decided not to abandon the fight against the re-election of Goetz until the organization leaders make their statement on the floor that the opportunity will be given members to offer amendments to the House rules.

A statement embodying the insurgents' interpretation of the agreement reached last night between Representative Longworth, Republican leader, and three members of their group, was drafted, to be read to the House by Representative Nelson, Wisconsin, chairman of the insurgents.

The first sign of armistice negotiation between Republican regulars and insurgents in the House came in a statement issued by Representative Longworth of Ohio, the majority leader, immediately after adjournment Tuesday afternoon. He made the declaration that "the House will have complete opportunity to adopt such rules as the majority may desire." The demand of the insurgents had been that the House have this opportunity.

After this statement had been published, leaders of the progressive bloc announced that they had arranged for a conference with Mr. Longworth Tuesday night to discuss the whole situation. They said they would not comment on his statement "at least until after any possible ambiguities have been removed."

A statement on the rules situation also was issued on behalf of the Democrats. Representative Garrett of Tennessee, their leader, declared that when the time came for consideration of the rules by which the House is to be governed, they shall have some definite concrete proposals by way of amendment.

Charles Ray Thrills Crowd in Splendid Picture "The Girl I Loved" at Sherrys.

Acting such as is seldom seen on the screen, and for that matter in the stage, is done by Charles Ray in his second United Artists picture, "The Girl I Loved," which had its first showing at the Sherry theatre yesterday. The audience was held spellbound by the sterling young artist, who has long been recognized as a star by right of sheer achievement.

A surprise is in store for those who have imagined Charles Ray's powers to be limited to the intense portrayal of ambitious youth. In "The Girl I Loved," which is said to be the story of James William Riley's early experiences in love and is taken from his poem of that title, Mr. Ray assumes a role that is highly dramatic.

Before a background of rural Indiana life in 1840, which has been carefully presented as youth whose mother, a beautiful orphan girl, an orphan child himself, he recounts the experience. Gradually comes a religious tolerance, and that in turn gives way to a brotherly affection which is beautifully depicted by the star and his leading lady, Betty Ruth Miller.

The appearance on the scene of a sailor for the girl's hand swiftly changes everything. For the first time the brotherly affection of the girl's father, the chance of losing her is a shock. It arouses in him the freeness of desperation. His rival, a likable fellow of the village, therefore becomes his dancin' enemy—a hated murderer.

The remainder of the story concerns itself with the fires burning in the young man's emotions.
