Germany Wants Kaiser Back, Declares Friend

SYRACUSE, N. Y.—Germany wants the Kaiser back. Return of the monarch is the only solution to the German problem, according to the opinion expressed by August Dietrich, an old and distinguished playwright of Wilhelm II, and student of Nietzsche.

"Germany wants the Kaiser back," said Dietrich, "and the Kaiser, even if he is a man of straw, is the only man who can lead Germany out of its present predicament. If you could have a man like the Kaiser, you would have a man who would lead Germany out of its present predicament."

"I notice in your article about this newspaper woman," says Mrs. Collinswood, "that she claims to be the first woman to take a ride in the queen of the West, the truck, train. If she wants something really worth while to write about she should say there all snow falls. This queen of the West is a new trainway. I take it, that has been built, but she should have taken a ride in the old one to experience real thrills. Last winter when there were such awful snows and a woman and her two children were crushed to death under their train, there was a little old lady who stayed up there and cooked for the others despite the chances of never getting down off the mountain. The station was at the foot of the mountain, and the bunk houses and other buildings at the top, only a matter of about four feet straight down, or up, whichever way one happened to be going.

"This particular afternoon, quite late, three men went down to the station to attend to the horses and mules. It was so dark they stayed down there all night, with a big
