URGE PENSION SUM INCREASE

Secretary Work Makes Annual Report Today to President Coolidge.

WASHINGTON, (AP)—An increase in Civil War pensions was advocated by Secretary Work of the Interior Department in his annual report submitted today to the President.

"The ravages of time," said the Secretary, "have now overcome these survivors of the Civil War and in their old age it is my belief that the pensioning of them should no longer be based upon a showing of disability due to wounds and disease. On the contrary, both the veterans and widows should receive a pension from the government after having reached a certain age, and the pension paid to them should be adequate to fully support them."

"I therefore recommend that some legislation be enacted by Congress to increase the pensions of Civil War veterans, and their widows thereby more fully recognize the debt the government owes them for the service they performed in preventing the disruption of the Union."

The Interior Secretary went into no further details and he likewise dismissed with brief comment the other points touched upon in his report—one of the shortest ever submitted by a cabinet officer. He summarized in a paragraph his repeated declaration for a new pension policy; notified the President that he proposed to undertake a survey of conditions in the Pension Office; asked for additional facilities for Howard University, a negro institution here under government supervision, and concluded with a sentence pointing out that although the Department's appropriation had been reduced by the last Congress the Budget Bureau now proposed an additional out of \$28,000,000 for the coming year.

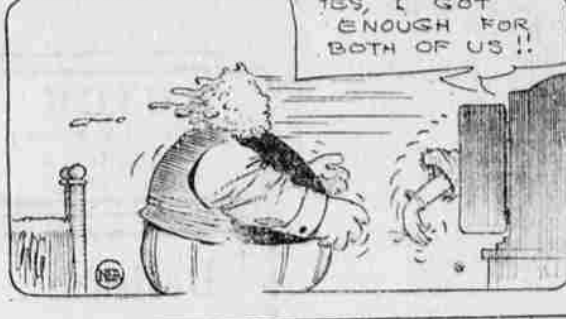
The pension problem was described by Mr. Work as presenting "a critical situation."

"The pension law," he said, "provides that the cost of construction of each project shall be paid within a 20-year period in installments of fixed amounts, and also provides the annual maintenance cost, including operation, shall be paid annually by the water users. Out of the 28 projects constructed, only 1 of these projects has fully complied with requirement notwithstanding that relief extending time of payment on three occasions has been granted by Congress. A number of them are in such a dilapidated state that it is difficult to preserve at the present time whether they will ultimately pay out, in order to ascertain the true conditions I have appointed a special committee of advisers composed of distinguished citizens of national prominence familiar with irrigation, irrigation and public works. As soon as their work is completed I expect to submit their report with recommendations to the President. This does not mean that the theory of government reclamation is unsound. It merely means that a new policy must be developed that will safeguard the future so that the government may proceed in a more orderly and business-like manner in its reclamation of the arid and semiarid lands of the West."

on the part of the public, that applications are laid away for about ten months before any action is initiated toward their examination." He added that the need for a comprehensive survey of conditions there "which I expect to undertake at the first opportunity" was apparent.

Increased facilities at Howard University, the report declared, were of paramount public importance. The institution is one of the two in the country, he said, which provides training for negro physicians and dentists, and recent statistics have shown that there is but one negro doctor to 2,214 members of the race and only one negro dentist to 29,268.

The Interior Department's receipts for the fiscal year of 1922 were given by the Secretary as \$62,566,641, compared to \$48,612,528 in the year previous. Most of the increase came from royalties from oil leases on Indian lands.

Spokane People to Spend \$100,000 Xmas

Spokane, Wash. (AP)—One hundred thousand dollars has already been set aside this year by Spokane people to buy Christmas presents with. This was the amount of the Christmas savings accounts in the various banks in Spokane one month before the holiday.

Further investigation of the savings accounts in the 14 banks and six building and loan associations operating here shows that the total represents savings of \$251 for every man, woman and child in the city.

Seven out of 10 people of Spokane, the figures indicate, are either investing in building and loan associations or putting a like amount of money into savings accounts. The banks show total savings deposits of \$12,250,000 and the building and loan associations, through individual accounts, add through individual accounts, add \$1,250,000 and 4500 new accounts. The figures represent a gain for the savings bank of more than \$1,250,000 and 4500 new accounts. Building and loan associations re-

port a gain of \$1,000,000 in deposits and at least 2500 new accounts.

Directions have been sent to all district offices of the bureau to give prompt attention to all pending cases of disabled veterans to clear them away before the holidays.
