MEMORIAL PARK FOR TIL TAYLOR TO BE ERECTED

PENDLETON.—The plans to erect a memorial to Til Taylor, former sheriff of Umatilla county, who met his death in line of official duties, have crystallized within the past few days and definite work toward realizing a memorial has already been done.

The memorial will consist of a beautiful bronze equestria statue, according to present plans, placed in the Til Taylor Memorial park in the east part of the city between Alta and Webb streets. The park was designated as the Til Taylor Memorial park Wednesday night by council.

A decision to erect an equestrian statue of the late sheriff was made in a meeting Wednesday afternoon of the Til Taylor Memorial Fund association. The association will save all of its funds for purchasing and erecting the statue, and the park development work will be done with the funds of the Pendleton Public Parks commission. This commission's funds represent the net profits made by the Pendleton Round-Up this year and amount to approximately \$10,000.

Obituary

GEORGE HENRY ROLLINS

George Henry Rollins, of Union aged 83 years, passed on to the Great Beyond in La Grande late Saturday evening. His remains are at the Snodgrass and Zimmerman funeral service parlors. Funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock from the Methodist church Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock. Mr. Rollins is survived by a son Percy, and two daughters. His wife died a few months past. Union and vicinity sorrowfully mourns his demise, as he was held in high esteem by citizens of his home-city and had always led a life that was above reproach.

UNION. (Special)—About noon Saturday George Rollins, who lived in South Union, became suddenly ill and the local doctors advised that he be taken immediately to a hospital. Early in the afternoon he was removed to the La Grande hospital and an operation was begun. It was found that part of his digestive system was paralyzed and the patient passed away while undergoing the operation. He could not have lived more than a few hours or days at the most if he had survived the operation.

Modernization of U. S. Fleet Urged by Denby

John P. H. Schofield of the Navy General Board analyzing in detail the objections which had been raised to the change in elevation, with the conclusion that these were wholly unsupported by any fair interpretation of the Treaty. Captain Schofield listed five "steps" as necessary in the physical alteration of a turret to permit the interior elevation, namely:

Increasing size of gun opening; lengthening the gun screw which raises and lowers the breech; changing positions of ammunition hoists; increasing amount of counter-rotational system, cutting away plates under breech.

In none of these steps, it was declared, was there involved any "alteration" in the general type of mounting which constituted the sole prohibition in the treaty affecting the program.

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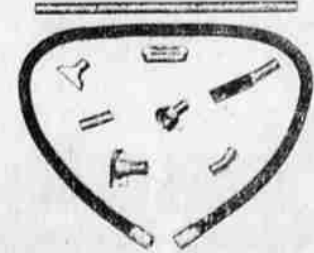
