BETTER BUTTER, CHEESE ONE AIM OF CONFERENCE

The improvement of the quality of Oregon dairy products, especially butter, will be one of the main topics at the state-wide agricultural economic conference at O. A. C. January 21 to 25. A special committee will formulate the program for the dairy work of the conference.

An analysis of dairying in Oregon followed by specific recommendations for the development of this industry will be undertaken by prominent dairymen, members of the college staff, bankers, members of commercial organizations and other interested individuals and group representatives at the conference.

Methods for increasing the efficiency of production will be included in the program. The value of pure bred stock with production records behind them, disease control, higher producing cows, the advantages of cow testing associations and bull associations, and other production factors will be considered.

Data bearing on these subjects will be presented at the conference by specialists of the college experiment station and extension service. Data will be given on the basis that dairying may be the major enterprise of a diversified farming program in Oregon.
