## SHAUGHNESSY PASSES AWAY

MONTREAL, (By Associated Press)—Lord Shaughnessy, chairman of the board of directors of the Canadian Pacific, died suddenly yesterday in his seventieth year. Heart disease and complications were attributed to be the cause of his demise.

Lord Shaughnessy, or Thomas George Shaughnessy, first Baron of Montreal and Ashford, County Limerick, Ireland, the head of the Canadian Pacific Railway, was born in Milwaukee, Wis., on October 6, 1853. He attended the public school of his native city and entered the company of the Canadian Pacific Railway in 1874. He was promoted to the position of vice-president and director in 1891 and became president of the company in 1895, retaining the position until 1913. He was knighted in 1901, made a Knight Commander of the Victorian Order in 1907 and raised to the peerage in 1915.

Mr. Hoover's direction for determining the financial condition of the United States as left by trade between in "winds" and "winds" exports and imports. It was noted that during the period under review—the fiscal year, 1922-23, commerce in general had revived, prices had fallen somewhat, and the nation had experienced prosperity.

"Through the high export billings of the last few years, we have shifted from a debtor to a creditor nation," said Mr. Hoover, "and the theory is now more or less generally accepted that our high export billings of exports over imports must ultimately shift to an excess of imports, as we have large balances to receive in payment of interest. The gradual reduction of the monthly export excess in 1922, culminating in the spring of 1923 in four consecutive months in which imports were larger than exports does not necessarily mean that this time has arrived."

In reviewing business conditions, Mr. Hoover declared activity had increased from month to month during the fiscal year. Agricultural production in some branches at least, had shared the oncoming prosperity to a very limited degree, he continued, because of the failure of prices for their products to hold with general price levels.

"The situation in most branches of agriculture," he continued, "seems to be gradually adjusting itself. The partial recovery in foreign demand for cotton has permitted a higher price for the crop of 1923 than for that of 1922, in spite of an increase of 14 percent in acreage and an appreciable increase in production. While the prices of hogs have been somewhat lower of late, the relatively high price of corn, which is chiefly fed to livestock, seem to indicate confidence of cattle and hog raisers in the future. The dairy industry in general is prospering, the demand for dairy products varying more than that for most other agricultural products with general movements of prosperity and depression in industry. As for wheat, which is more dependent on foreign markets than any other agricultural product and which is subject to greatly increased competition from Canada and other foreign countries, it seems necessary gradually to reduce acreage."
