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Woodrat Plants Spuds
In the Yakima Valley

YAKIMA, Wash. (AP)—The fact that a common woodrat made time last summer elected to scratch earth over a few potatoes left in the field is the reason why Mr. and Mrs. Angus French, pioneer farmers of the Yakima valley, can eat new potatoes at a time of year when the community is preparing to entertain snow in quantity.

Last summer a few tubers remained in the fields, Mr. French said, which were buried by a woodrat. Notwithstanding a lack of sunshine and care, they flourished and grew rapidly. Now the vines are producing medium and large sized new potatoes, a delicacy which the French family is enjoying every day.

The potatoes have a flavor equal to the first June crop, Mr. French said, and some of them have reached a circumference of 10 inches. They are a product of dry farming, being grown on the old French homestead which is not under irrigation.

Salem Police Facing Perplexing Problem.
SALEM, Ore. (AP)—Because a recently enacted motor vehicle parking ordinance contained no clause covering the activities of the horse drawn carriage, the police of this city has been confronted with a perplexing problem.

The question now is, how long may "old Dobbin" remain parked on a street without being notified to move on? Police authorities were first confronted with the difficulty when a farmer drove into town with a horse and buggy. Having supplies to buy at a store on the busiest street, he swung in to the curbing and parked in the most approved manner, with the buggy's rear wheels to the curb and at an angle of forty-five degrees.

It was pointed out by the police that the man driving a horse propelled vehicle could overstay the 40-minute time limit set for motor vehicles, at his own discretion since nothing in the ordinance pertained to horses.

A suggestion was made that the matter be referred to the Humane society.

that time has been steadily sinking. Her death is received with a heavy shock among her many friends in this district.

The deceased was 77 years of age and was one of the first persons to come to the Grande Ronde valley. She accompanied by her first husband, Jerry Dean Huntley who passed on twenty years past, came to the Grande Ronde valley from Kansas in 1871 and located on what is known as the 121 Apple farm.

The remains are at the Shoup-grass and Zimmerman funeral service parlors. Funeral arrangements are not yet arranged.

Mrs. Nelson was born in Lafayette county, Wisconsin, at the village of Monroe. Her father, John Streeter, was a captain on a Michigan Lake ship. She went to the state of Kansas when eight years of age, accompanied by her older sister, with whom she lived until she married nine years later, Ben and her husband then lived in Kansas a few years but finally Mr. Huntley sold his land and moved to Arkansas. They remained there two years and then made up a wagon train consisting of themselves, their two children and two other families, and crossed the plains to the Grande Ronde valley. About a decade ago Mrs. Huntley married G. W. Nelson.

She is survived by four children, Leonard Huntley, of La Grande, Mrs. Hattie Fritzell, of Imbler, Albert E. Huntley, of Idaho, and Emma Gray, of La Grande, and her husband and several grandchildren.
