

VISITORS ARE MANY AT LAKE

Usual "Quiet Period" of Holidays Fails to Materialize at Hot Lake.

HOT LAKE, (Special)—Tradition, which decrees that the weeks between Thanksgiving and Christmas shall be a time of "quiet" and comparatively few guests at the Hot Lake Sanatorium, is being broken. At the end of each day during the past week the registers have shown an unusually and increasingly large number coming here for treatment and operations.

Violet Bishop and Miss Grace Ryde, of Toronto, Canada, Miss Bishop comes to assume the duties of head nurse, while Miss Ryde, also a nurse, will be on duty here. Both are graduates of the Toronto Western Hospital, where Miss Bishop has recently been night supervisor. She has also done public health work in Toronto, while Miss Ryde has been engaged in industrial work.

He was until a few years ago an enthusiastic booster of co-operative enterprises having served as president of the Idaho-Oregon Fruitgrowers' Association from 1914 until 1918 and manager of it until then until 1921. During seven years of that time he was also president of the parent organization, the North Pacific Fruit Distributors.

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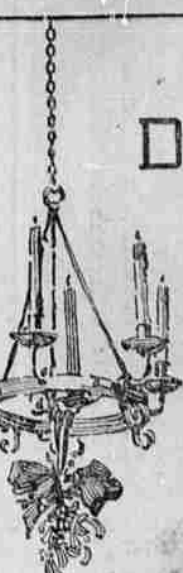
